METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, Dec. 3.—"There is no cold weather in sight," said the man at the meteorological office this morning. He explained that in the west they were having weather similar to that enjoyed here, only that the nights were colder, while the low temperatures have disappeared from Quebec. The reports for the month of November show that they have had snow in the Northwest Territories, Manitoba, Northern Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick. Southern Ontario was generally free from snow. In Toronto during November the average temperature was 27° above the average.

3 p.m.—Light local sleet or rain has fallen in the Georgian Bay district and the Ottawa Valley. Elsewhere in Canada it has been generally fair. There is no cold weather anywhere, and no immediate prospect of any. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 46-46; Calgary, 24-34; Qu'Appelle, 20-26; Winnipeg, 12-24; Port Arthur, 13-26; Sault Ste. Marie, 34-36; Pelly Sound, 32-33; Toronto, 28-43; Ottawa, 30-34; Montreal, 32-34; Quebec, 23-34; Halifax, 24-40.

Local temperature.—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory here on Monday, Dec. 3, were: Highest, 53°; lowest, 26°.

Today (Tuesday) the sun rose at 7:34 a.m., and sets at 4:42 p.m. The moon rises at 2:22 p.m., and sets at 5:26 p.m.
