President Shaffer was averse to talking on the subject. from his original position.

The steel officials reiterated their previous statements that no overtures for peace had come from the strikers, and that the strike could be settle

only by the return of the men to their Notwithstanding that all preparations had been made, the tin plate mil at Bemiller did not resume. There was much excitement in the vicinity of the plant all night, and several hundred strikers guarded the approache to the property, but no new men ap peared, and there was not the slighter

disorder.
