The report of the supreme grand pre-sident was a most comprehensive one, special mention being made in opening of the death of Queen Victoria, the accession of King Edward, the recent imperial tour of the Prince and Princess of Wales, and the death of Bro. George F. Carrette, a founder first grand president of the society.

The report stated that the past two
years had been characterized by
steady progress in membership and steady progress in membership and improvements in the condition of the various funds. The financial condition of the lodges was declared to be exceed'ingly gratifying, the lodges having to their credit the largest balance since the formation of the society. More vigorous organization ciety. More vigorous organization work was urged by the grand president, who thought the time was ripe for a large increase in membership. The small increase in the number of lodges during the past term was ex-

plained on the ground that attention had been devoted rather to the work of strengthening existing lodges.
