BAD FIRE AT POND MILLS

Cheese Factory Was Burned Early This Morning.

Loss Will Probably Be Entirely Covered by Insurance.

The manufacturing plant of the Pond Mills Cheese Company, owned by the Thames Cheese Company, was destroyed by fire between 2 and 3 o'clock this morning. The extent of the loss is as yet unknown, but it is said that considerable of the contents of the place were secured from the blaze.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

W. G. McLaughlin, inventor of the McLaughlin airbrake, lies ill of blood poisoning in his car at Walkerville.

The United Garment Workers' Union of America began its eleventh annual convention in Cleveland Monday. One hundred delegates, representing 2,000 outters, tailors and overall workers

The city of Ottawa has been divided into areas, certain streets being allotted to each gardener as his exclusive preserve for trade. The gardeners also will refuse to sell to Hebrew peddlers, who have hitherto done a big business, and will regulate the supply to greengrocers.

CONTINUES TO FLOURISH

Sons of England Society Makes a Good Showing.

Substantial Increase in Membership—Financial Standing Satisfactory.

Winnipeg, Aug. 13. — The Supreme Grand Lodge of the Sons of England Benefit Society met yesterday afternoon in its biennial session, the supreme president, Mayor Fred Cook, of Ottawa, in the chair. Fully 100 delegates were present from all parts of Canada. After a reception by the civic authorities and the local lodges, the grand officers' reports were presented, all tending to show a period of unexampled prosperity, since the last meeting of the grand lodge.

The report of the supreme grand president was a most comprehensive one, special mention being made in opening of the death of Queen Victoria, the accession of King Edward, the recent imperial tour of the Prince and Princess of Wales, and the death of Bro. George P. Carrette, a founder and first grand president of the society. The report stated that the past two years had been characterized by steady progress in membership and improvements in the condition of the various funds. The financial condition of the lodges was declared to be exceedingly gratifying, the lodges having to their credit the largest balance since the formation of the society.

More vigorous organization work was urged by the grand president, who thought the time was ripe for a large increase in membership. The small increase in the number of lodges during the past term was explained on the ground that attention had been devoted rather to the work of strengthening existing lodges.

The report of the supreme grand secretary showed that the total receipts for 1900 were \$83,515.19, with an expenditure of \$60,728.10, and for 1901, \$57,565.12, with an expenditure of \$53,954.63. The total membership was given as follows:
