prosperity of the lumber business, and Of the Enemy 18,320 Were Either Killed or Captured.

> The British Casualties Numbered 9.113—How Commandant Erasmus Was Captured.

London, Jan. 8 .- A published review of operations in South Africa during the past year, based upon official reports, gives an interesting comparison of Boer and British losses.

The review says that the total reduction of the Boer forces in killed. wounded, taken prisoners and surrendered amounts to 18.320 men. Out of

this total only 7,993 rifles were secured. The captures of Boer ammunition amount to 2,300,000 cartridges. British columns are supposed to have secured all the Boer artillery, amounting to 27 guns, exclusive of the two captured by Gen. Dewet at Zeefontein. The capture of Boer stock have been enormous, considering the great hauls made during the earlier years of the war. During the last year a total of 29,882 horses were captured; while of

other stock, such as cattle, oxen and sheep, 366,821 head were captured.
The British casualties from actual fighting amount to only half of those sustained by the Boers, namely, 9,113 men, of which 1,513 were taken prisoners and have since been released. During the year 4,903 men died of disease, 150 officers and 342 men were killed accidentally, and 25,800 were in-

valided home. A WEEK'S WORK. The Cape Town correspondent of the Times says the summary of weekly official reports from the end of last June to the end of December shows 1,162 Boers were killed, 876 wounded, 7,593 captured and 1,912 surrendered.

CAPTURE OF ERASMUS. A correspondent of the Times, who is with Gen. Bruce Hamilton, gives details of a night march and the sur-Boer party on Friday morning last. The enemy's trail was found at 3 o'clock in the morning, and after it had been followed along a winding valley, the Boers were surrounded at dawn. A few of them es-Forty surrendered, including Commandant Erasmus and the re-mainder of Pretorius' commando. Two other Boers were subsequently caught with 300 cattle. The same evening another group of Boers was surprised

nearer the British camp and twenty were captured, with five wagons. A BRITISH POST ATTACKED. Bloemfontein, Jan. 8 .- A Boer force attacked a British post at Brand Drift, near Thaba N'Chu. The post consisted of a sergeant and three men. The Boers, who numbered 40, rushed the post at night, shouting, "Don't shoot, we are Pilcher's men." The post was overpowered and stripped before assistance arrived. When reinforcements reached the place there was a sharp fight, in which two British officers ed, taking their wounded with them. A railway bridge across the Modder River is in course of construction. It is expected that the railway to Thaba N'Chu will be completed in six months,

Excellent Condition of King Edward's Health.

Rehearsal of the Royal Procession for the Opening of Parliament.

Lord Rosebery to Entertain Cecil Rhodes-Springlike Weather in England-Miss Stone Is Alive.

New York, Jan. 8 .- The King's health is all that can be desired, cables the London correspondent of the Tribune.
