G. T. P. Steel Is Nearing Depos-Western Fair, London .... Sept. 10, 18 its in Pembina. Alvinston .....Oct. 5, 6

> which a week ago was in this city has now reached Stoney Plains, the second town west of Edmonton, and is pushing the steel ahead as rapidreaching of which will terminate the steel-laying for this year. The company is very anxious to reach this point, as here lie the enormous coal fields of the Pacific Pass Coal Company, which is supposed to belong to the Grand Trunk Pacific. Announcement has been made that the company intended to secure its coal from these mines for the driving of their trains on the western as well as the Edmonton division.

Prospectors have been in the field for several menths, and reports which have emanated from the wilderness state that the coal which they have discovered, and which i .. Sept. 29, 30 found outcropping on the 5,000 Oct. 2 acres controlled by the company, is very much superior to the coal of the Edmonton district for engine g purposes

The Pacific Pass Coal Company has its machinery under order, and the first Grand Trunk Pacific train to pass over the line to the west of Edmonton will carry the machinery, which is to be used in the development of the largest coal mining camp in Alberta.

The estimated expenditure on the works during the next year has been placed at \$500,000, and as rapidly as possible new machinery will be installed, until the entire acreage under the control of the company is being worked. By the first of December, this year, the company expects to be delivering 10,000 tons per day, and after that date much larger shipments, as fast as the requisite machinery can be installed.
