**ENGINEER GRAYDON IS****ABSOLUTE NECESSITY**

So Ald. Sanders Told Board of

Works at Meeting Last

Night.

"City Engineer Graydon is indis-

pensable," declared Ald. Sanders at

the meeting of No. 2 committee last

night. "There has been a lot of criti-

cism about the department of late, and

I want to place myself on record on

this matter. Mr. Graydon does work

in the office. He is there in the office

six hours a day, and because of his

knowledge he is indispensable for some

time yet. He is not drawing his salary

for nothing. The situation is simply

this: We are getting the same ser-

vice that we have had for years at

\$1,200 less a year. This is what it

amounts to, and instead of being an

extravagant arrangement it is cer-

tainly economical.

"I do not mind fair, straight criti-

cism, but City Engineer Graydon should

be given at least credit for what he

is doing."

City Engineer Wright also added his

word of commendation, and declared

that Mr. Graydon was of great assist-

ance to him, and helped him at every

turn.

The incident then closed.

**C. M. B. A. CONVENTION****An Attempt Made to Oust the Present****Executive.**

Ottawa, Aug. 12.—What looked like

the inception of a concerted effort to

oust the present grand president of

the C. M. B. A. from office was nipped

in the bud at this morning's session

of the convention by a large vote

against the proposed resolution. It was

moved in effect by Delegate Friel, of

Dorchester, N. B., that any member

of the grand council be eligible for the

office. This means that any delegate

to the present convention would be

able to take the office if elected. At

present the constitution provides that

to qualify for the presidency a mem-

ber must have served a full term in

some subordinate elective office of the

grand council. There was an exciting

discussion on this motion, which

was defeated just at the close of the

session, the members supporting the

present executive rising to their feet

and cheering him to the echo.

Two other important matters were

dealt with, it being decided to let

the present method of representation at

conventions stand. A proposal to divide

the convention into territorial coun-

cils was defeated, the laws committee

reporting adversely against the pro-

position.

**NOT PLEASED****WITH DOMINION**

British Teachers Say There is Too

Much Money Getting.

Montreal, Aug. 12.—The party of

fifty British school teachers who have

just completed an extensive tour of

Canada, left on the Tunisian, in an

interview with a Toronto correspond-

ent on the ship. Mr. G. G. Gentry, the

leader of the party, handed out a

rather tart criticism of the Dominion.

There was much to admire about the

country, and he thought the trip had

profited the teachers, but he deplored

the fact that Canadiana seemed to be

bent on the acquisition of the dollar.

Mr. Gentry gave Montreal a particu-

lar roast, saying that the streets were

a disgrace to civilization.

With regard to educational matters,

Mr. Gentry said the party had been

impressed with the fact that, consid-

ering the differing conditions, the

school teachers in Canada were not as

well paid as in the old country, which

had naturally resulted in the profes-

sion being forced largely into the

hands of underpaid girls. While the

proportion in his party was fairly

equal between men and women, that

would obtain in Canada, and the

pay of teachers in the old country was

such that men could engage in it still.
