

FACILITIES ARE IMPROVED

Reference Room Downstairs and General Reading Room on the Upper Floor Have Been Decided Upon.

The most important extension work that has been done for some years was decided upon at last night's meeting of the library board, when the recommendation of the finance committee that the room now used as a reference room after Nov. 1, 1910, and that the upper east room be used as a general reading-room after that date

The committee were given power to get prices and tenders for the necessary furniture and improvements, and report at the next meeting to be held in September

Assistants Appointed. Miss Lilian Grant and Miss Annie O'Meara were appointed lady assistants, but will not commence their

duties until September.
"We want," said Librarian Carson to The Advertiser, "to develop the utilitarian side of the library to the utmost. We are now handling twice as much work as we ever did before. Each of the lady assistants handles more than 30,000 books a year, and in other Canadian libraries not more than from 15,000 to 18,000 are handled. We are featuring the reference department work. In all the American libraries they have what is known as a municipal reference department, containing all the auditors' reports and other documents from each city. Any alderman or citizen can get there and in a short time compare tax rates water rates or anything else he wishes to. We intend establishing a reference library of this kind. We are aiming also to get more closely

touch with the employees of factories. Educating the Men. "Many firms now are sending their men here for information. In future we intend having a draughting table in the reference department, so that employees can use tracing paper to make sketches for themselves of new and up-to-date things. We also want

to become the reference library for the Western University.
"We are even now to a large extent, but we aim to become more so. We will also have departments for commercial reference for the use of the business houses. We receive many calls for information of this nature. A department of special use to the press will be an index of all events and important general information. We are in a position to secure all the best reports on various subjects, and if they are kept and indexed they will


