SUPPORTS PASTOR IN
EXPOSE OF BETRAYER

London Minister Declares Queen City Man Acted Properly in Reviving Old Custom.

"I think we are too inclined to handle cases like that with kid gloves; too much inclined to cover up wrong-doing in the church," said Rev. Humphrey A. Graham, of Centennial Methodist Church, in reference to the action of Rev. Peter Bryce, of Faircourt Methodist Church, Toronto, who publicly exposed before 300 members of the Men's Own Association on Sunday, a member of his congregation and of the club, who had effected the downfall of a young girl, who died in a maternity hospital in Toronto a week ago.

The young woman was brought to Canada a few years ago by the Waifs and Strays Society. The man who had led her astray neglected to make any provision for her, and after the birth of her baby, she told her story to Rev. Mr. Bryce and a deaconess of the church. Afterwards she returned to the hospital, where she died. She was quite desolate, and Rev. Mr. Bryce wrote to the man asking him to at least provide decent burial for her. He ignored the letter, but his brother over the telephone made an appointment for him with Mr. Bryce, which he failed to keep. Mr. Bryce had warned him in the letter that unless he saw that the young woman was decently buried, he would expose him in the church, and on Sunday morning Mr. Bryce did so.

"I think if he had been a minister, he would have supported Mr. Bryce," said Rev. Mr. Graham to The Advertiser. "He is one of the most successful and able ministers in the Methodist Church and I know he would not take any such course of action without trying every other way first."

An old custom formerly prevailed in the Methodist Church of calling to time before the pastor, officials and members, any member who was guilty of a serious misdemeanor. Rev. Mr. Bryce's congregation of men acquiesced in his course of action, and subscribed towards defraying the funeral expenses of the unfortunate girl.

INTER-A. Y. P. A. DEBATE

St. Paul's and St. George's Societies Discuss Merits of Ward System.

"Resolved, That it would be for the benefit of London to return to the old ward system of voting," formed the subject of a keenly contested debate between members of St. George's and St. Paul's Anglican Young People's associations, held last night in St. George's schoolroom.

Mr. Fiegle, of the visiting society, led the affirmative and was ably supported by Miss "Theophrastus," while Mrs. S. E. Sims and Miss Louise Gahan advanced equally strong arguments in favor of the negative. As there appeared to be a slight misunderstanding as to whether or not a return to the ward system would do away with the board of control, the judges were unable to make a clear decision.

Dr. W. F. Tamblin, H. B. Galpin and F. Hodgins acted as judges. During the evening solos were acceptably rendered by Miss Elsie Smith and Jack Pope, and recitations by George Dordridge. At the close of the program refreshments were served by the St. George's Association.

GLOBE TROTTERS COMING

Austrian Cyclists To Visit London on Trip 'Round the World.

A pair of interesting globe trotters, Mr. and Mrs. H. Hubert G. Haasler, of Vienna, Austria, are expected in London on May 1, on their 25-year tour of the world. They are cyclists, and the tour, whereby they will secure 25,000 crowns, must cover 10,000 miles. They started in 1904 from Vienna, Austria, when they were twelve years old, both having escaped from an orphan asylum. They were married in Buffalo, N. Y., after Hattie completed his tour of the United States last year. The couple is now at Berlin.

REV. G. A. MACKENZIE
ADDRESSES MINISTERS

Talks to Congregational Association on "Ministers' Vital Equipment."

Rev. George A. Mackenzie, pastor of the Christian Workers' Church, Ottawa avenue, was the chief speaker at the morning session of the Western Association of Congregational churches in the Southern Congregational church today. "The Minister's Vital Equipment" was his subject.

Rev. Mr. Mackenzie quoted from Adam Smith that "God works in human history by means of specialized functions." The Christian church is one of these specialized functions, said Mr. Mackenzie, and while it is useful for a pastor to have the modern view of the value of social training and institutional church life, yet a pastor's real equipment consists in recognizing the spiritual qualification which God has made the one real essential of a successful ministry. The order of preparation for this spiritual equipment is proceeding into death with Christ.

"Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone. If it abide alone, it shall be consumed by the fire, and shall be as chaff," said Mr. Mackenzie, "we also rise with Him. By the baptism of the Holy Spirit, He gives to His ministers that spiritual equipment which is the only one that will make the proper use of their ministry."

This afternoon Rev. W. H. A. Claris, of the Southern Congregational Church, spoke on "The Minister's Prayer Life." Tonight Rev. G. E. Morley, Rev. Mr. Pierce, who is to leave shortly for the mission field, and others, will speak at the closing session.

About thirty delegates are in attendance at the convention. This morning very encouraging reports were read from all the churches in Western Association.

Good Progress Reported at Annual Meeting Last Night.

The church wardens' financial statement for the year ended on December 31, of \$7,600, after all liabilities had been met. \$200 DAMAGES GIVEN

Second Suit For False Search Against Smallman's Won By Plaintiff

Damages in the amount of \$200 were awarded Mrs. Alice Eckardt by the petit jury of the Middlesex assizes this morning in her suit against the Smallman-Ingram Company. The action arose out of a search of her person on December 18 last, when she was accused, with her mother, Mrs. Isabella Bolton, with stealing a tie in the store of the defendant company. The jury yesterday awarded the mother \$200 in a similar suit arising out of the same episode. In both cases \$2,000 had been asked.

M. D. Fraser, K.C., counsel for the defence, entered a motion for nonsuit in both cases, arguing that respective plaintiffs had made out a case of assault. The suggestion of searching emanated from the daughter, and following up this evidence, they submitted to the search. There was no evidence of forcing. Both knew their rights and realized that they could refuse to be searched.

R. G. Fisher, counsel for the plaintiffs, submitted analogous cases in which it was held that no evidence of assault was necessary, but that apprehension of restraint offered legal ground for plea of restraint.

The suit brought against the Grand Trunk Railway by Percy Summers, the London fireman who received severe injuries when the motor truck on which he was riding crashed into a train, was the next on the calendar, but W. E. Foster, counsel for the railway, was not ready to go on, owing to the illness of one of his witnesses. In none of the civil cases immediately following were the solicitors ready to proceed.

In the case of Luscombe vs. Luscombe, et al., Mr. Justice Kelly gave an order that Mrs. Luscombe should be examined at her home. Dr. Walter Moorhouse gave evidence to the effect that her nervous condition was such as to make dangerous a court examination.

Court was adjourned until 9:30 tomorrow morning, when the case of the crown against Thomas Riley, charged with the murder of George Blackburn, will be heard.

UNVEIL BUST OF
WILLIAM T. STEAD

Many Pacifists Present at Solemn Ceremony in Peace Palace at The Hague, Netherlands.

The Hague, Netherlands, April 15.—Solemn ceremonies marked the unveiling today in the Peace Palace of the bust of the late William T. Stead, the English writer and pacifist, who was a victim of the Titanic disaster two years ago. There was a distinguished audience of pacifists and diplomats, representing many countries.

The unveiling, address was made by Jonkheer Van Dackme Van Vraick, chairman of the committee which collected the funds for its purchase. Other speakers were Lord Weardale, Charles Richel, of Paris, W. Sun-Tehou, Chinese minister; Dr. Henry Van Dyke, United States minister to Holland, and John Stead, son of the late W. T. Stead.

The bust was carved by J. Seltsma, a young Dutch sculptor, and is considered one of the finest among the many busts of famous peace workers sheltered by the Peace Palace. Practically all of the funds for the bust were collected in Holland, but all parts of Europe and America are represented on the list of subscribers.

EXTENDING CHURCH

18-Foot Addition Started at Centennial Methodist Edifice.

Sisters of Londoners Have Established English Record.

did not comply with the American demands, the first step to enforce them would be the seizure of Tampico and Vera Cruz, for which he considers there is ample precedent.

Many Causes.

Washington, D. C., April 15.—An official statement, setting forth the view of President Wilson and the Administration, disclosed that the Tampico incident alone was not the cause of the sending of the fleet and the preparation to back up the demand for an apology. It disclosed the hitherto unpublished facts that official dispatches from Washington to Charge G. Haughnessy, who had been accepted and delivered to a Mexican censor; that a ship's orderly, sent ashore for mail at Vera Cruz, was arrested, although he was in full uniform, and carried the Government's mail pouch on his back, and that the successful effort to the United States has convinced the Washington Government that its representatives are being singled out for indignities.

It pointed out that with other nations having representatives in Mexico, none of them had found it necessary to ask for apologies.

Will Consult Congress.

The congressmen who saw the President said he talked with him, declared he was of serious nature, such as the landing of marines or the shelling of a town, without authorization from Congress.

"Marines have been landed before," said Chairman Flood, "but without authorization, and towns have been shelled, but in as much as Congress is in session, it would be more regular to get authorization from Congress. Congress, I am sure, will stand by the President."

Senator Shively, likewise described the conference as chiefly informative.

Republican Agrees.

Senator Lodge (Republican) said he was in accord with what the President had said, and expressed his approval of the demand for the salute and the dispatch of the fleet was in accord with precedent.

No Quibbling.

President Wilson, according to the congressmen who talked with him, declared he had given a reasonable time to Huerta, and that, while the time was without any fixed limit, there would be no quibbling, and that prompt action would follow Huerta's failure to comply.

The exact status of affairs today, Senator Shively characterized as unchanged, "except that the United States will insist with all the power of this nation upon reparation for the defiance of the Huerta Government."

No Developments.

Washington, April 15.—This dispatch from Rear-Admiral Fletcher at Vera Cruz, dated 10 p.m. last night, was received at the navy department today.

"No new development at Tampico. Constitutionalists have retired from the vicinity. Business resumed and refugees returned. Mexican gignboats Progress and Zaragoza left Tampico."

LICENSE RECIPROCITY

Motor Owners to Wait on Provincial Government.

"Motor car owners from all over the province will form a huge deputation to wait upon the Provincial Secretary, Hon. W. J. Hanna, to ask for a revival of the proposed new license fees and an interchange of New York and Michigan State licenses with Ontario. Dr. H. A. Kingsmill left for Toronto last night to represent the London and Western Ontario Motor Club."

The Ontario Motor League made a similar request for an interchange of courtiers with the State of New York at the last session of the Legislature, but the question was then turned down by the Government.

WANT THE COUNTRY
PUPILS TO PAY MORE

School Boards Ask Govt. for Fairer Apportioning of High School Costs.

Toronto, April 15.—Thomas McGarry, M.P.P., for Renfrew introduced an influential deputation to Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education, today comprising representatives from some fifty school boards throughout Ontario. The speakers were S. T. Chown, Renfrew; E. A. Doolittle, Orillia; A. Weir, Sarnia; R. J. Tolmie, Windsor.

Mr. Chown, as the chief speaker, pointed out the injustices of the present system of apportionment of the high school cost, and asked that a more equitable basis be formulated under which country pupils would pay a fairer share of the cost as well as the interest on the cost of the schools. Last Christmas, when Miss Lester presented them each with a silver medal as a mark of appreciation.

There are 125 schools to be affected by the proposed change.

RUMORS OF TROUBLES
GET WORSE IN CHINA

Sun Yat Sen Said To Be Calling For Uprising and Massacre.

London, April 15.—Chinese government today arrested a number of revolutionaries who had come from Japan, according to an Exchange Telegraph Company's dispatch. They were charged with spreading sedition among the regular soldiers.

At the same time documents were seized, alleged to be signed by Dr. Sun Yat Sen, former provisional president. They are said to contain instructions for widespread uprising and massacre of officials this month.

GOOD AS BRITISH, BUT
CANNOT GET ORDERS

Germany Deplores Fact That England Does All the Ship-building.

Montreal, April 15.—A Berlin cable to the Gazette quotes Herr Baillon, director-general of the Hamburg-American Steamship Company, as saying "our shipbuilding prices are cheaper, our delivery times are more reliable than those of British shipbuilders, with minor exceptions, invariably capture the shipping orders of the whole world."

Montreal, April 15.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R., spoke a few words today of the great and character of the late Sir William Whyte.

"Sir William Whyte was officially connected with the Canadian Pacific for upwards of thirty years. Capable, industrious, devoted to his duty, with a character of the cleanest and best, type, he was held in the highest respect by every officer and employee with whom he was associated."

"No one had a more thorough knowledge of affairs and conditions in Western Canada than Sir William Whyte, and while he could not always see eye to eye with the people of the West when railway matters were under discussion, I doubt if any man ever lived there for whom the entire community had greater respect and, indeed, affection."

BUILDING UP TO \$139,890

With Month Only Half Gone 128 Permits Have Been Issued.

With April but half gone, 128 permits, representing an expenditure of \$139,890 have been issued by Building Inspector A. M. Piper. In March of this year, 115 permits, totalling \$139,890, were issued, and in April of last year, with 223 permits, the total was \$521,350, this figure, of course, including a \$250,000 permit for the new McCormick factory.

"Everything is looking well," said Inspector Piper, today, "and prospects are excellent for the Dominion today."

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1,000 DELEGATES TO
HARDWARE EXHIBIT

That Many Will Be Here Next Year, Says Industrial Commissioner.

LONDON, PLACE SELECTED

Executive of Associations Confirm Decision Made at Last Convention.

The annual joint convention of the Canadian Hardware Association and the Retail Hardware Men's Association will be held in London next February. At a meeting of the executive of the two bodies held in Toronto on Monday this was definitely decided. Industrial Commissioner Gordon Philip attended the meeting, and made the announcement on his return today.

When the hardware men met in Ottawa this year, the mayor and Lieut.-Col. W. M. Gartschore extended a hearty invitation to them to come to London in 1915. The invitation was practically accepted, but it remained for the executives to formally decide the matter. Other cities offered strong inducements and there was also a meeting to turn the convention into a five-day boat trip in July, but the strong claims put forward by London over the delegates and decided them in favor of this city as the next meeting-place.

The sessions and exhibits of hardware products will be held in the Armouries and not less than one thousand delegates will be here, according to the industrial commissioner. At the most conservative figure it is estimated that each delegate will spend \$7 per day. One thousand delegates at \$7 per day for five days, would leave \$35,000 in the city.

President McKenzie and Secretary Tobin, of the association, are in London today completing the final arrangements for the convention. A. M. Hunt, secretary of the Western Fair, and chairman of the board of education, has been manager of the association's exhibits for the past several years.

"A. M. Smith, of the McClary Manufacturing Company, who is a member of the executive, did exception good work in securing the convention for London," said the industrial commissioner today.

The United States had amassed great riches and the people of Canada wanted the Government to guarantee to this country every possible weapon to be able to meet such powerful rivals.

Premier is Quoted.

He quoted the statement of the Premier in Parliament on February 23, "We cannot allow the ports and railways of the United States to deprive us of a part of our trade. Parliament must come to a decision on the Georgian Bay Canal question."

"Every delegate here agrees with this statement," declared Mr. Fortier.
