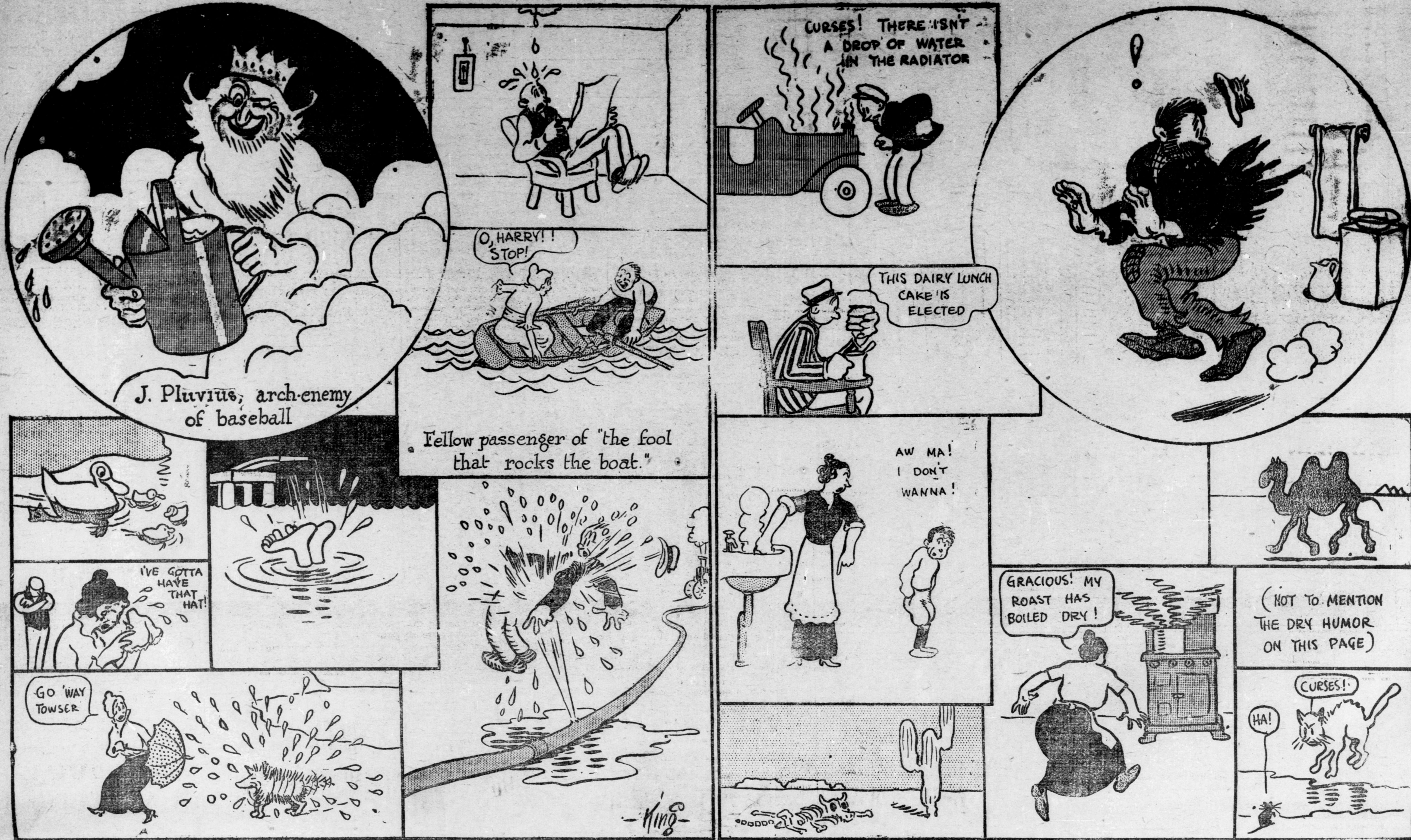

"Orders were given by the Kaiser recently to his head gamekeeper to wait day and night for a fine stag which had escaped the Imperial gun for a week, and to let him know, whatever the hour, if it appeared," says the Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail. "At 6 o'clock in the morning news was brought to the Imperial bedroom that the stag had been seen. 'Tell him to wait,' said the Kaiser going to sleep again."

M. Delcasse's Working Day.

"M. Delcasse is expected back in Paris in the first days of February. His mission has now definitely concluded in St. Petersburg. It is considered that he has aided considerably in the solution of problems affecting the two countries in the Near East by his consistent and strenuous labors," says the Paris correspondent of the Fall Mail.

"He carried out his habits of work in St. Petersburg, rising at 5 and working until 7. After breakfast his custom was to take walking exercise. Thereupon he resumed the study of his paper until lunch. The afternoon was spent in the same way, until, at 5 o'clock, he broke off to visit the Russian foreign office. Dinner followed, and then retirement for the night at 9."

"M. Delcasse made a personal sacrifice of his comfort, and even of his immediate political ambitions, in going to St. Petersburg, for he could have been Prime Minister in the interim. An invitation in this sense has been extended to him at least six times, in his career, but he has always refused."

Gill's Threepenny Piece.

"Sir David Gill, the astronomer, who died on Saturday, told many good stories, often against himself. He used to delight in telling how in an address as president of the Institute of Marine Engineers he said, 'Now we can measure within a hundredth of a second of an arc, which is like measuring a three-penny piece at a distance of a hundred miles, and how at the dinner afterwards the proposer of his health said there was no doubt as to his nationality, because no one but a Scotsman would bother his head about a three-penny bit a hundred miles away.'"

"Sir David was emphatic on the question of canals on Mars," says the Mail, "and once said, 'I fail to see the remotest proof of habitation of men, and deem these canals to be merely a feature of the landscape.'"

Sir David Gill was born at Aberdeen and was educated at Marischal College and Aberdeen University. He started his career in astronomy by a suggestion that accurate time should be determined in Aberdeen and was placed in charge of the private observatory at that town. In 1879 he was appointed astronomer royal at the Cape of Good Hope, and held that post for twenty-eight years.

EXPLORERS ALWAYS KEEN FOR THE TRAIL

Shackleton Feels It But Cannot Explain Fascination of It.

TELLS OF NEXT TRIP

Declares Result of Antarctic Adventure Lies on Knees of the Gods.

LONDON, May 25.—Sir Ernest Shackleton, at a Pilgrims' Club gathering at Savoy Hotel outlined his plans for his his polar expedition and kept his audience enthralled all the time he was speaking.

Sir Ernest's scheme is to cross the Antarctic polar region from the Weddell Sea to the Ross Sea, taking in the pole en route. He begins his great adventure next October.

"We are going to try to cross the south polar continent," said Sir Ernest. "Why we go I cannot say. What the impelling force is that makes explorers I cannot describe. It is one of the sort of things of which, if you could describe it in so many words, half the charm and half the interest would be lost. When you are in the antarctic you have an uncomfortable time, frozen one minute and roasted the next, but when you come back to civilization and sit down to dinner, before you have been home six months you want to get out on the lone trail again."

Charm Surrounds Travel.

Sir Ernest said that he could imagine nothing better in life than to be marching through unknown country like these regions and then, after sleep, to awake and find surrounding them hills or mountains which they knew no man had ever seen before. There must be some sort of interior pride that made one want to look on things no man had previously seen. He could not analyze the psychology of travel.
