

## DR. HILL THROWS BIG BOMBSHELL AMONG DOCTORS

Director of London Institute of Public Health Says Dirt Has Little To Do With Disease—Dr. McCallum Honored

[Canadian Press.] ST. JOHN, N. B., July 7.—A bombshell was thrown into the meeting of the public health section of the Canadian Medical Association at their opening session this afternoon, when a paper prepared by Dr. H. W. Hill, of London, Ont., promulgated the doctrine that dirt has little to do with disease.

Dr. Hill contended that much of the activity of boards of health and medical men was based on the mark, and that they might be much better occupied promoting conditions enabling men to live a more natural life than is possible for many city dwellers at present, than giving so much attention to dirt and other unsanitary things. He said that statistics from Port Hope showed that the sanitary law breakers had not one-third less

deaths and only half as many cases of infection as the law keepers.

Dr. Hill's views called forth strong protests from Dr. C. A. Hodgetts, medical adviser to the conservation commission, and other prominent doctors.

In the evening there was a general session, presided over by Dr. McCallum, of St. John, the new president, and addresses of welcome were delivered by Lieut.-Gov. Wood, Hon. J. D. Hazen, and Mayor Frink, followed by an address in medicine by Thomas MacFarlane, of Philadelphia.

## Suffragettes Break Out In Police Court

Bombard Officials With Pens and Paper and Shout Complaints About Treatment—Mrs. Pankhurst Has Brief Freedom.

[Canadian Press.] London, July 8.—An end was put today to the brief respite in the militant suffragette agitation, when Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the leader, resumed command of the forces of the Women's Social and Political Union at their London headquarters. Mrs. Pankhurst, who reoccupied the offices at noon, was not molested by the police, although they knew of her intention, and had detectives on duty in the vicinity.

Simultaneously with the reappearance of Mrs. Pankhurst, a violent scene was created in the central criminal court, where Mrs. H. F. Alice Hall, Miss Grace Roe, Miss Julia Jameson and Miss Ellen Armes were brought up for trial for conspiracy. The charge against them was that of "conspiring with others maliciously to commit damage and injury, and to spoil certain real and personal property of the liege subjects of our lord the King."

New Grenade Found. The prisoners had been arrested during a raid on a West End flat on May 21, and in their rooms were found a new shrapnel grenade of very ingenious manufacture.

## ARE PROVINCIAL CHARTERS GOOD FOR WHOLE DOMINION?

This Question To Be Argued Before Privy Council—Important to Companies.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, July 7.—The companies act will be argued before the privy council tomorrow and E. L. Newcombe, K.C., the deputy minister of justice, will leave for England shortly to uphold the federal contention.

The provinces claim that companies which they incorporate have the right to do business throughout the Dominion. The federal government claims that such companies can do business legally only in the province which incorporated them.

Should the decision go against the provinces, a few hundred provincial companies will have to seek federal charters.

Such a judgment will put at least a million dollars worth of fees into the government treasury.

## WESTERN RAILWAYMEN PREPARE AN ULTIMATUM

Employees of 67 Companies Decide to Take Strike Vote.

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, Ill., July 8.—Representatives of the freight handlers, warehousemen and trainmen of 67 railroad lines west of Chicago, were occupied today in preparing an ultimatum to be sent to the board of managers of the roads. The executive committee of the employees yesterday voted to take a referendum strike vote in the organization. A strike vote by the engineers and firemen of the roads already is in progress. At the meeting yesterday the committee decided that all the railroad employees would act together in the matter of their demands.

## WESTERN ONTARIO HAS A SERIES OF MOTOR ACCIDENTS

Leamington Woman Seriously Injured and Goderich Man Has Ribs Broken—Several Other Women Also Hurt.

[Special to The Advertiser.] LEAMINGTON, July 7.—Mrs. Arthur Ludlam, wife of one of Leamington's largest lumber dealers, is in a very critical condition as a result of being pinned under an auto driven by her husband near Comber late last evening.

Mr. Ludlam was unconscious for four hours, and J. D. Ainslie, his partner, who was riding with him, and Miss Medd, of Essex, were badly cut and bruised.

Mrs. Ludlam had her shoulder broken, and received serious internal injuries.

Overturned at Roadside. The accident, it is stated, was caused when one of the occupants rose to adjust the wind shield. The car, however, and Mr. Ludlam, who was driving, tried to right it. It swerved again, however, and going into the ditch at the side of the road, overturned all the occupants beneath it.

## HANNA LIKELY TO BE NEXT PREMIER

Sir Adam Beck Will Not Accept, It Is Said—T. W. McGarry May Be Given Portfolio.

TORONTO, July 7.—Today's cabinet meeting was barren of any results so far as an announcement from the Prime Minister was concerned. "We only dealt with an accumulation of routine business and were unable to reach the appointment of a workman's compensation board or other matters of public interest," said Sir James Whitney at its conclusion.

Council sat for several hours, the only absentees being Hon. J. J. Foy and Sir Adam Beck.

The feeling is gaining ground that there will be no hurry over the appointment of a successor to Hon. J. O. Reame or even his retirement. There is no doubt, however, that Dr. Reame will eventually retire from the government and make way for a younger man representing another section of the party, and this gives weight to the rumor that the appointment of Sir James Whitney as Minister of the Interior will be followed by the appointment of Sir Adam Beck as Minister of the Interior.

One close to the Government stated that Sir Adam Beck would not accept the chairmanship of the workmen's compensation board, his intention being to remain in the government. The fact that Mr. Hanna will remain in the cabinet is taken by his friends to mean that he will succeed Sir James Whitney as premier when the time comes, as Sir Adam Beck has let it be plainly understood that he would not accept the office even if it were possible for him to do so. This means that Sir Adam has no other purposes in mind cannot now be said.

## WAS LURED TO TOLEDO AND ROBBED OF \$5,000

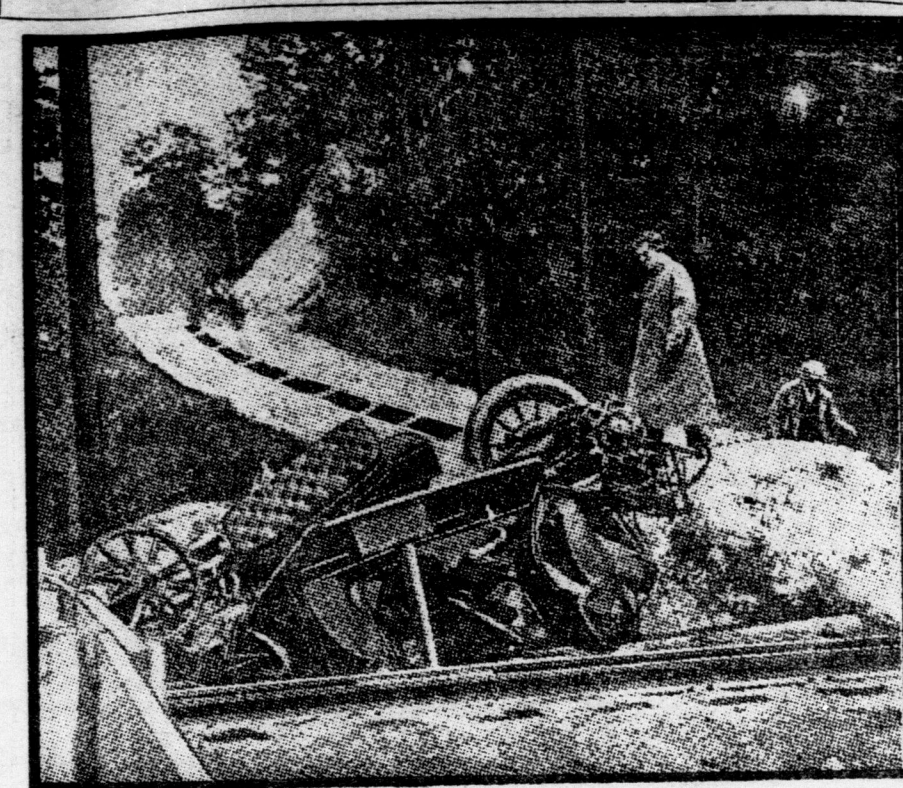
Young Blenheim Farmer Said to Have Been Victim of "Con" Men.

## London Is Spending \$200,000 on Asphalt

Forest City Has Undertaken Active Permanent Paving Program.

Asphalt pavements, which will be laid down in London this year, will cost the city upwards of \$200,000, with three important stretches yet to be initiated.

The following streets will have to be paved, if the pavements are not down already, before October:

York street from Waterloo to Wellington.

Talbot street from York to Simcoe.

Clarence street from Horton to York.

Victor street off the Wharncliffe road.

Yale and Harvard streets (now completed).

Park avenue from Queen's avenue to Dufferin avenue (completed).

Waterloo street from Princess avenue to Wootton road, for its entire length (five blocks now completed).

Wellington street from Queen's avenue to Dufferin avenue.

Burwell street, Dundas street to York street.

King street, Wellington street to Colborne street.

King, Burwell and Wellington streets will be completed in about a month, or the time the Old Boys will be here.

The three streets upon which asphalt will be initiated if the council passes the work with a two-thirds vote are: Talbot street from Fullarton street to St. James street; York street, from Richmond street to Wellington street, and Waterloo street, from the G. T. R. tracks to South street.

The cost of all these pavements will run over \$200,000, but will not exceed \$225,000.

## LOOKS AS IF "BOS" CONVENTION IS ON IN LONDON TOWN

Birds of Passage Appearing in Police Court in Large Numbers.

SLEEP IN LARGE ROOMS

One Has Whole Box Car to Himself—Chose This Existence to Life in Hamilton.

London has been hit hard lately by transients, mostly from Toronto and cities east. Scarcely a freight train enters the city which does not carry several of the birds of passage. Just why London is selected as the hesitating point for the "we won't work" crowd is not known. In police court the same stereotyped excuse is given: "We thought there was work here."

This morning four transients appeared on the railways appeared before the magistrate. They were James Maher, Charles Morrison, James Brown and Robert McGee.

Who Would Blame Him? Maher stated that he was from Hamilton. He was found sleeping in a C. P. R. box car. He was let go with a warning.

The other three were found blissfully unconscious that the law was bearing down upon them, in a Michigan Central merchandise car. They explained that finding the door open and having no other place to sleep they had hopped inside to spend the night. Finally it came out that Morrison was from Kerwood. He told the court that he had telegraphed last night for money to his employer there. He will be held until his statement is investigated.

Never Again. The other three were let off with the understanding between the trio and the court that if they make their appearance before the magistrate again, either bunched or single, they will be sent to practice farming at Guelph.

"This is getting altogether too common an occurrence," said the court in disposing of the cases.

## PORTUGAL TO CONSTRUCT SECOND NAVAL SQUADRON

In Spite of Strong Opposition From Socialists and Republicans.

[Canadian Press.] Madrid, July 8.—Despite strong opposition by Socialist and Republican deputies, the Lower House of Parliament passed yesterday, by a large majority, a bill providing for the construction of a second squadron, consisting of four battleships and several minor vessels to be completed in five years.

Frederic Dato stated that the purpose of the Government was mainly to keep the navy yard at Ferrol working, as any suspension in the naval program would put several thousand men out of work.

## ROCKEFELLER QUIETLY CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

Seventy-Five Years Old, He Spends Day on His Estate.

[Canadian Press.] New York, July 8.—Although John D. Rockefeller is 75 years old today, no celebration is being held at his estate, where he is spending the summer. Mr. Rockefeller planned to follow his daily practice of playing his eighteen holes of golf. Weather rarely interferes with that exercise. Later in the day he may take an automobile ride. He will probably also go to the rounds of the estate with his superintendent. There will be no birthday gathering, as Mrs. Rockefeller and her sister are in feeble health, and John D. Jun., is at Seal Harbor, Me.

Many congratulatory messages have already been received, which pleased Mr. Rockefeller, although he said he wished the day might pass without publicity.

## BOMB HURLED THROUGH WINDOW OF RESIDENCE

Owner Superintendent of Factory Lately Closed After Strike.

[Canadian Press.] Wakefield, Mass., July 8.—An explosion, which the police believe was caused by a bomb hurled through a window, wrecked two rooms in the residence of Richard S. Stout early today. No one was injured. Mr. Stout is superintendent of the Cane Splitting department at the factory of the Heywood Brothers and Wakefield Company, which was closed recently after a prolonged strike. No trace has been found of the person thought to have thrown the bomb.

## STORSTAD RELEASED

Purchase Money Paid In and She Goes to Quebec.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, July 8.—The collier Storstad, which rammed the Edgworth of Ireland, was released from the arrest under which she was placed by the C. P. R. after the collision by the payment into court this morning of the \$175,000 for which she was sold yesterday.

The Storstad left for Quebec, where she will be repaired.

## SAGINAW CHINAMEN DENY BEING ILLEGAL RESIDENTS OF U. S.

Sensational Evidence of Smuggling in Orientals on Large Scale Expected.

Bay City, Mich., July 7.—The six Chinese arrested at Saginaw yesterday were brought to the United States court here at noon today and arraigned on charges of illegal residence in the United States. All pleaded not guilty, and their bonds were fixed at \$2,000 each for five of them, while the bond of Lee Mon Tip, who is only 16 years old, was placed at \$1,000. Two attorneys from Saginaw represented the prisoners and said that bail would probably be furnished for their clients at once.

No testimony was taken. District Attorney E. J. Ladd, Detroit, will be here July 21 and 22 to conduct the examination. In the meantime federal immigration inspectors are expected here from Chicago to assist Inspector C. V. Mallet, and it is expected that sensational developments of smuggling Chinese into the country on a large scale will be unearthed before the examination is ended, and that more and more serious charges may be made against some of the prisoners, together with others not yet under arrest.

The five beside Lee Tip are Lee Chung, who has been operating a laundry in Saginaw; Lee Tong Kai, Lem Chee Hong and the Bay County Jail pending release on Lam Kin Shin. The six are being held in jail.

## MEXICANS TO CONFER ON THEIR OWN SOIL

This Is Constitutionalist Wish, to Divorce Proceedings From Mediation.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, D. C., July 8.—Mexican territory probably will be chosen for the scene of the proposed conference between Huerta's envoys and Constitutionalist delegates over plans for the establishment of a provisional government. Constitutionalist representatives in Washington today expressed preference for a neutral place in Mexico—probably along the border—for the peace parley. Two of the Niagara mediators—Ambassador Da Gama and Minister Suarez—were to confer in New York today over details of the meeting.

The Rebels' Desires. With discussion among the Constitutionalist leaders apparently nearing adjustment, members of the revolutionary junta here repeated expressions of confidence that the proposed Huerta-Carranza conference would take place. The Constitutionalist wish to divorce the conferences from any relation to the Niagara mediation proceedings, so that the Mexican people may thereby understand the method by which their new chief executive is agreed upon.

Nuevo Laredo Likely. Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, has been considered as a most likely choice for the scene of the parley. It is opposite Laredo, Texas, where quick communication by telegraph and cable can be arranged with Mexico City for the Huerta delegates. Communication southward with Constitutionalist headquarters also would be easy. All troops would be withdrawn from the scene of the peace conference, so that the delegates of both sides would be free from local influences.

Members of the Constitutionalist junta said that any answer from Gen. Carranza as to participation in the conference would arrive within another week.

## HINDUS GIVE UP LONG FIGHT TO ENTER CANADA

Those on Board Komagata Maru Will Sail Away This Week.

[Canadian Press.] VANCOUVER, B.C., July 7.—Gurdit Singh and his "committee of safety" on the Komagata Maru, have agreed to drop their fight for entry into Canada, and the end of this week is expected to see the Japanese steamer with her 39 East Indian passengers steam out of Burrard Inlet, never to return.

It is understood that a conference was held on the vessel this morning between W. D. Loder, representing the Dominion Government, as counsel; Mr. Bird, counsel for the Hindus; and Mr. W. G. Hopkinson, inspector of the Dominion Immigration Department.

Waive Their Right. It is understood that Gurdit Singh and his companions this morning agreed to waive their rights in connection with demanding boards of inquiry, and said that the department could issue a deportation order at once. They realized that a board of inquiry for each of the 352 Hindus on the Komagata Maru would keep them there an interminable time, and for no purpose, for they must go unless they can raise a small fortune to appeal the decision of the appeal court to the privy council.

Gurdit Singh and his followers are in dire straits. The local Hindu committee has refused to give them any more provisions, claiming that the Hindus on hand have reached the bottom of their purse.
