

GERMANY FEARFUL OF BEING STARVED

The "Blockade" Proclamation Shows She Dreads Navy's Power On Sea.

Non-Belligerent Powers Asked To Help End "Destructive War."

Berlin, Feb. 7. — Germany officially has given out the full text of "The Memorandum of the Imperial German Government Concerning Retaliation Against the Measures Taken by England, in Violation of International Law to Stop Neutral Sea Commerce With Germany."

"She does not even hesitate to violate the Paris declaration, as her naval forces have been ordered to seize German property which was not contraband, in violation of her own decrees concerning the London declaration. She has taken, through her naval forces, hundreds of neutrals, numerous Germans liable to military service, and has made of them prisoners of war.

"Finally, she has declared the whole North Sea to be an area of war, although she has not made impossible the passage of neutral shipping through the sea between Scotland and Norway.

Review of the Trouble.
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On December 11 the Turkish soldiers at midnight attacked the British consulate in Hodeida and Consul Richardson fled to the Italian consulate where he was followed and surrounded by the Signor Cecchi, the Italian consul, for his surrender. The demand was made in the name of the Governor of Yemen. The Signor Cecchi declined to give up Mr. Richardson, one hundred Turkish soldiers with cannon surrounded the consulate and broke down the wall with axes and pickets. They also fired into the building, wounding a servant. Consul Richardson was then surrendered. Signor Cecchi was not permitted to leave the consulate for several days, according to one version of the affair. It was stated that he was to be treated as a prisoner on a charge of having housed the British vice-consul and also with firing on Turkish soldiers. He was finally released on the arrival of the Italian steamship Guiliana.

Italy demanded that Mr. Richardson be returned to the Italian consulate and that the British consul in Aden and the Governor of Yemen dismissed the officials connected with the seizure of the consul, returned Mr. Richardson to his post and allowed him to leave the country. The paying of honors to the Italian flag, as indicated in the above dispatch signals, is carrying out of all of Italy's demands.

DURING PAPER PRAYER

ROME, Feb. 7.—(4:30 p.m.)—There was an impressive scene at St. Peter's this afternoon, when Pope Benedict intoned his prayer for peace.

The great edifice was thronged with worshippers from the pontifical surroundings by 22 cardinals, mounted to the papal altar. Standing between the four richly-gilded spiral columns of the apse, Pope Benedict began the prayer, which was repeated by the kneeling multitude, whose voices echoed throughout the great temple. The pope turned to the "God of all mercies, King of Peace."

The Pope, on arriving and departing, was accorded an ovation. As he was leaving the ceremony, he heard many cries of "Long live the Pope" and "Give us peace."

PROPER PLACE ONLY

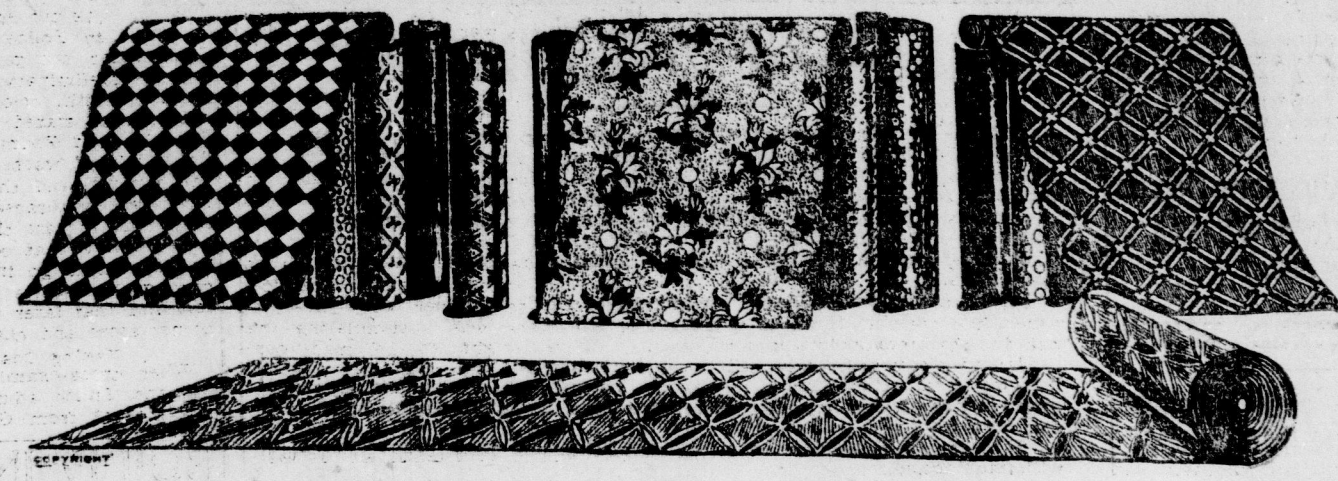
