

DR. COLE PHILOSOPHY WILL RESTORE YOUTH

Forbes Lindsay, Noted Writer,
Claims Auto-Suggestion Turns
Time Back Fifty Years.

STAYING IN LONDON

Has Long Believed in Power of
Doctrine To Build and
Heal.

Interesting sidelights on Cosmism, projected by one who is probably the most authoritative exponent of the science, with the exception of Cole himself, in America, were given to 'The Advertiser' today in an interview with Forbes Lindsay, noted writer and psychologist, who is staying in the city.

Mr. Lindsay is the author of more than thirty books, an eminent traveler, and particularly distinguished for his largely-circulated dissertations, such as "The Psychology of Success," "The Elements of Salesmanship," and other compendiums on various branches of psychology. He believes Cole is doing an epoch-making work. His enthusiasm for the benefits of auto-suggestion is unbounded. To demonstrate that he is not merely a devotee of Cole, but that he believed, preached and practiced auto-suggestion long before Cole was heard of, he produced a number of books on the subject written by himself many years ago.

Witch Doctors Cured.
"The gospel of the witch doctor of savage tribes is laughed to scorn by the present so-called civilized man," said Mr. Lindsay, "but there is no doubt that the old-time witch doctor wrought marvelous cures, not by the employment of medicine, but by auto-suggestion. He would tell his patients they were getting well, and by the sheer strength of his own personality would convince them that they actually were getting better. This much sickness was cured through the unconscious use of auto-suggestion."

"Fifteen years ago my elbows were worn out. I was down and very much out. I acquired the idea of auto-suggestion by mere accident, and convinced myself that everything was possible if man will only believe in himself. Proof of the efficacy of that theory is borne out in my own experience. I am 44 years of age, and have two of the finest children. In 1908 I was about 70 years of age, computing age as I judge it. Today, I am about 35 years of age. What is responsible for this change? Only the application of auto-suggestion."

"Cole is a fine man. Orthodox doctors need not fear possible subjection through the popularity of Cosmism. Medicine and surgery are the brothers of auto-suggestion. One as necessary to the other as air to life."

Power in Imagination.
"One secret of achievement is imagination. Cultivate penetrative imagination. Not the coldly analytical kind, but the warm, emotional sort that invests its subject with sympathetic interest and appreciation. The man who lacks imagination—whose mind is incapable of penetrating beyond the material aspect of things—is deficient in one of the most potent mediums of self-development."

"Another element is faith—faith in oneself. Faith is the philosopher's stone, the transmuting elixir of the chemist."

"The trouble with the average man is that he is superficial. He rarely penetrates beneath the surface of anything—of himself least of all. One believes in himself. This is why he has accomplished virtual wonders."

"In Cosmism anything like Christian Science," he was asked.

"Christian Science has no," the author replied. "But after all, the two are identical. Christian Scientists contend that physical well-being is a divine gift, and one must place faith in the divinity rather than in oneself. But all psychologists realize that divinity is in yourself. You place faith in your divinity."

Mr. Lindsay was now engaged in lecturing in various cities of the United States and Canada.

POLICE COMMISSION TO DEAL WITH BYLAW

Tomorrow's Session Will Test
Right of Press to Attend
Sessions.

A final test as to the right of the press and general public at business sessions of the police commission will be conducted at a special meeting of that body tomorrow at 3:30 p.m.

"Open to the world" was the intimation from Mayor Wenige this morning, when he had given final directions for the gathering. Chief among the items for attention will be the approval of the new omnibus bylaw recently drafted by the city councillors and a consideration of the situation involving the detective department.

Questioned again this morning in the latter connection, Mayor Wenige reiterated his belief that the entire issue would be thrashed out.

"There have been conflicting reports about a communication that was received from Detective Egeiton as to his possible superannuation," His worship was asked "what is the precise situation?"

"A letter was read at the inaugural session of the police commission," Mayor Wenige replied, "asking for an extension of his leave of absence until January 1, with the further intimation that he desired to tender his resignation at that time. What the date of the communication was, is of no particular consequence. The paper was there."

His worship explained that nothing had developed in the meanwhile. Detective Egeiton had again been confined to his bed.

The blaze was, however, extinguished before any damage had been done. The barn was insured.

A coincidence lies in the fact that the board of education only last week authorized the sale of the barn to be used for the housing of construction material while building operations are under way on the new public school.

Secretary W. A. Tanner informed the Advertiser this morning that the property would be legally transferred without further delay. He insisted, however, that the board of education would have broken even, had the fire destroyed the structure, as adequate insurance had been carried on the building for some time.

FIRST BOND OPENS AT CITY HALL TONIGHT

Mayor Wenige Calls In Council Members for Initial Parley.

"All hands on deck."

The preliminary bout opens in the city council chambers tonight, with Mayor Wenige and his twelve aldermen in special parley. The press will be represented, but at this moment it is uncertain whether any report will be published.

As a matter of fact, nothing definite may transpire. "It's just going to be a get-together session," Mayor Wenige explained. "To review the council situation and if possible, devise ways and means to conduct the business of the city hall in such a manner as to bring the best results for the most people. In short, get returns for every dollar of the people's money that is expended."

The proposed reorganization of the assessment department with the retirement of the present assessment commissioner will receive its initial consideration.

"Efficiency," general throughout the hall will be another item, while the advocated repeal of the 1922 salary bylaw and the abolition of bonuses for city officials will likely precipitate one of the liveliest debates that has been witnessed in municipal chambers.

All the city is watching the outcome of tonight's gathering—the first real test of the new administration at the city hall.

MOTHER WITH TWINS DIE IN PITTSBURG FIRE

Third Child and the Proprietor

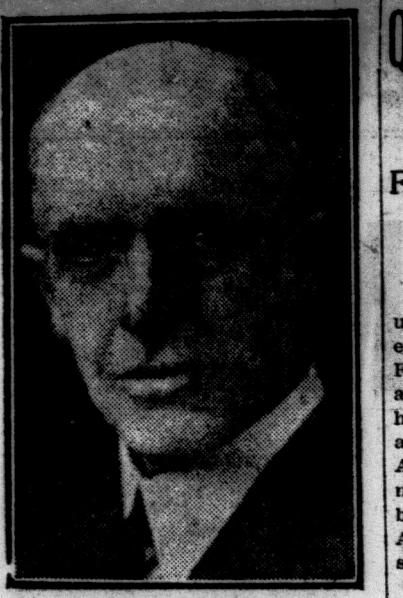

MINERS OF THE RUHR STRIKE AS PLANNED

Westphalian Workers Lounge
About Pits—French Troops
Also Present.

Essen, Jan. 22.—German miners throughout the Ruhr today carried out their strike threat and refused to work.

Mines that supply a considerable part of all Germany's fuel supply, were idle. Grimy Westphalian workers lounged about the pits with folded arms. They appeared at the shaft heads at the usual hour this morning and were lowered into the pits. French troops with bayoneted rifles were at some of the mines. No work was done at any of the state mines, however, the men unanimously joining in the passive resistance demonstration against arrest and imprisonment of Prussian mine officials.

German today declared that Fritz Thyssen and other coal barons imprisoned at Mayence have been thrown into cells "like ordinary jail birds." They are to be court-martialed, together with twenty or thirty other prominent German industrial leaders of the Ruhr, for refusal to obey French orders.

The French are hopeful they can break down Germany's passive resistance. There will be no attempt made at first to enforce labor at the Ruhr mines.

ITALY CALLS ON U. S.
