In the case of Mani-toba especially, although there are a good many farmers who are not going to get number one hard wheat, as they had expected, still they are getting 90 cents net at the elevators for their feed wheat and that is more than they got in 1923 for their best

See Mixed Farming.

"In this province the farmers are seeing the absolute necessity of going into mixed farming and of making the poultry and butter pay part of the farm expenses. The old Ontario style of mixed farming is becoming more prominent now in Manitoba and that means a great deal in the way of permanent perity. The farmers are paying their way as they go, lifting mortgages and getting out of debt, and in Manitoba things are looking very much

brighter than they did last year.
"I was particularly pleased with Alberta as a farming province. There are more trees and bush there and more shelter for cattle. The country was looking very well indeed."

OFFICIAL'S GRADING PLANS PROGRESS

School Inspector G. Wheable Hopes To Have System Working in Three Years.

SEEKS TEACHERS' AID

G. A. Wheable, public school inspector, is making progress with the statistical end of his new charting scheme looking to the establishment of a uniform standard for grading the pupils of the public schools at

the examinations held throughout the year.

When he has completed this phase of the work the inspector counts on calling together all the teachers of a certain grade an ask them to give him a number of questions for grade under consideration. Th spector, after examining these ques-tions, will send a list of them to teachers with instructions to them to attend a meeting at which they should be prepared to discuss the questions fro mall angles. Discussion will then follow as to how the questions should be marked and why. In this manner the inspector hopes to get the teachers thinking along the same lines and marking the papers along the same grade.

it will require two or even three years' time to get his charting and standard grading system functioning and working satisfactorily in all grades throughout the schools of the Statistics prepared by Inspector

This difference is accounted for by the fact that many of the pupils skipped from grade III to grade V. In spite of this fact, however, the averages for the year were considerably better.


