The question of church union will affect the W. M. S., as it has the whole of the Presbyterian church, but this organization is pledged to carr on until June 10 and will do so. Not since 1915 has the provincial W. M. S held its annual meeting in Lon-don. On this occasion it was the first meeting after the amalgamation the home and foreign mission

The following history of the society, which dates back as far as 1864, has been written by the secretary, Mrs. J. Cowan, of Toronto.

The history of the W. M. S. is that of Canada in the making. It is a story of courage and high advanture. It is made up of the union of three societies, the oldest being the French Mission society of the Church of Mission society. Mission society of the Church of Scotland, formed in Montreal in 1864; the Women's Foreign Missionary society, organized March 21, 1876, and the Women's Home Missionary society, organized in 1903. The amalgamation of these societies took place on May 5, 1914. The year 1924 was celebrated as a jubilee year of the work and the tenth year of the united societies.

Auxiliaries formed by the women of the various Presbyterian churches throughout the province, along with young women's auxiliaries, mission bands, C. G. I. T.'s and other associate societies, form the base of the W. M. S. These report to presbyterial societies. Oldest Organization.

The oldest organization, the French Mission society of Montreal, did valuable work among the French. remodelled the girls' school at Point-aux-Trembles; raised scholarships to aux-Trembles; raised scholarships to assist girls at that school; worked among the poor and sick—both Roman Catholic and Protestant; underbook work in the northwest until in 1914 as many as ten stations were taken care of to the extent of \$250 each. S. was not organized until March 21, 1876, when fifty women were enrolled as members. At the end of the first year 18 auxiliaries were reported and three mission bands. Offerings to the extent of \$1,105.39 were reported. The object of the mission bands was to gather the children together for instruction and create interest in mis-




