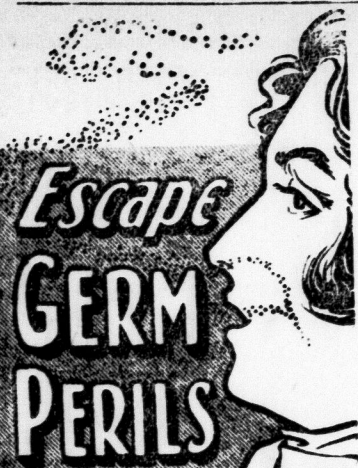

WOMAN BRAVES AFRICAN PERILS

Mrs. Delia J. Akeley Accomplishes Record Feat in Transversing Dark Continent.

New York, Oct. 22.—For the first time in history a white woman has crossed darkest Africa alone. She is Mrs. Delia J. Akeley of the Brooklyn museum of arts and science.

Armed only with ordinary travel papers and carrying credentials as a special correspondent of the North American Newspaper Alliance, she started from Lamou, on the east coast of Africa, on October 16 of last year.

She came out at the mouth of the Congo river, on the west coast, on September 3, and arrived in New York today.

After a three months' perilous journey through the jungles and deserts of East Africa, she reached Nairobi and sent out her last communication with civilization.

Entering the Central African jungle at Ka-Sinyi, on Lake Albert, with only twelve cartridges, she reappeared at Matadi on the Congo river five months and 26 days later, with three cartridges unspent and five hitherto unknown specimens of jungle animals. This was Mrs. Akeley's third visit to the dark continent.

She is about 50 years old and her previous visits were made with her husband, Carl Akeley, the famous explorer, who persuaded Theodore Roosevelt to make his African hunting trip.

Five Months' Struggle.
Mrs. Akeley spoke today of her latter and more difficult stages of her journey, her unprecedented five months' struggle across Central Africa to the Atlantic. She saw only two white men during this time, a Belgian official and a Swiss trader, and was entirely alone in charge of her convoy of black porters.

"I ventured with a slender stock of ammunition, because I was unwilling to wait for more at Lake Albert," she said. "The penalty I paid came four months later in the forest, where the pigmies, a Congo tribe, yellowish in color, and averaging four feet in height, coveted the use of my gun against elephants, whose meat was needed for food, and against whom their only weapon was poisoned arrows."

"Decoyed by the pigmies before a herd of elephants I escaped with my cartridges unspent, but fell under a charging buffalo which had been wounded by an arrow. Limping back to my camp with a badly injured thigh, I immediately distributed my reserves of palm wine, tobacco and salt to the menacing pigmies. During the feasting I escaped with my

Preparation Inadequate.

"The first stage of my trans-African journey across the Somali desert had to be undertaken without adequate preparation, because I received warning that the governor was about to forbid my trip, because of its danger to a woman. I forestalled his message by plunging up the Tana river in a dugout with two blackes."

Mrs. Akeley began her African explorations with her husband in 1905 as a collector of birds and butterflies. On that trip she used a gun for the first time, killing an eland and a gazelle with the first two shots she had ever fired. Beginner's luck like that, she says, gave her the confidence that has made her one of the world's famous markswomen. She will spend the next few months writing and lecturing. She will leave again for Africa in March on another expedition for the Brooklyn museum.

MEIGHEN TRYING TO HIDE BLUNDER

Alleged Whispering Campaign Can Easily Be Traced to Admissions of Tory Leader.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—In large advertising space throughout the country Mr. Meighen, under direction of Conservative headquarters in Toronto, issues a denial over his signature of what he describes as a "whispering campaign," to the effect that he is in favor of the amalgamation of the two railways. In reality this advertising is a belated attempt on the part of Mr. Meighen and his campaign directors to overtake a blunder he himself made at the very outset of his stumping tour.

If there is "whispering" with respect to Mr. Meighen's intentions regarding the railways, it is due to his own admissions. There is unmistakable evidence of alarm on the part of the public as to Mr. Meighen's policy concerning the National railways, and it is traceable, not to any "whispering campaign" instituted by his opponents, but to his own statements. Supporters of the National railways, and believers in national ownership, found cause for apprehension in Mr. Meighen's speech at Winnipeg on Sept. 19.

Made Ambiguous Statement.
In that speech the Conservative leader emphasized the debt on account of the National railways, and

Trying to Cover It Up.

Deeper significance was given Mr. Meighen's ambiguous statement by the fact that it was picked up and emphasized by the principal newspaper supporter of amalgamation, the Montreal Gazette. It was supposed in Ottawa that Mr. Meighen had gone thus far in an effort to win the approval of the enemies of the National railways in Montreal.

Mr. Meighen, it is remarked, has not repeated the assertion he made in Winnipeg since the alarm it gave rise to was called to his attention. But it was that speech which caused the "whispering," which he is now attempting to overcome. It is a matter of further significance that the Conservative campaign in Quebec is being supported by avowed enemies of the National railways, whose latest plan of getting them out of the way is that of amalgamation with the C. P. R.

JOHN FORD OF RODNEY ANSWERS DEATH CALL
Rodney, Oct. 22.—The death of John Ford occurred this morning at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. John Milton. Mr. Ford was 85 years of age, and was a lifelong resident in this vicinity. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. J. H. Milton, of this place. The funeral will be held on Friday, Services at the home of J. H. Milton, Furnival street. Interment in Rodney Cemetery.

This ambiguous statement was regarded at the time as significant, and it is a matter of record that within a few days after its utterance Mr. Meighen felt called upon to deny

that he had committed himself to the amalgamation of the national railways with the C. P. R. What, it was asked, was the thing "we have got to do, that we don't like?" Mr. Meighen did not say, but in the same part of his speech he mentioned that the thing he did not like was amalgamation. The assumption was that if he could not end national railway deficits by stopping expenditures on Scribe hotels and Yonge street skyscrapers, he would be prepared to go in for amalgamation.

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MOVING VAN TRIES RIVER NOSE DIVE

Narrowly Escapes Bath When Gangplank Chain Breaks at Sarnia.

Sarnia, Oct. 22.—The ferry boat Lawrence was delayed fully an hour today when a chain on the gangplank broke just as a moving van, owned by the Tripp Moving and Storage Co. of Port Huron, was passing over. The breaking of the chain caused the van to slide between dock and boat. It was hauled back to land by a truck and transported to Port Huron on another ferry boat. The van was being driven by Vern Dutton, who was accompanied by Reed Lovett, a helper. Both live in Port Huron.

The death occurred at Mooretown on Thursday of Mrs. Grace Chambers, widow of John Chambers, a former well-known farmer of Moore township. Mrs. Chambers was aged 76 years 11 months, and had resided in the township all her life. The funeral will be held on Saturday at 1:30 p.m. at Fromfield cemetery.
