Mrs. (Rev.) J. A. R. Dickson, of Galt, is here at present on a visit to her father.
Mr. H. Smith, of Toronto, son of the Superintendent of the Street Railway, is home on a brief visit.
Mr. Edmiston, of Woodstock, has been engaged by the Embro School Board as Principal of the school, duties to begin January 1st, 1899.

Messrs. Waterworth & Bell have secured the contract for a new brick station on the G. T. R. at Ingersoll. The work will be commenced at once.
On Thursday night a four-year-old child named Blanchard was knocked down by a carriage on the corner of Richmond and York streets, and considerably bruised.
Constable Finbow, of Laurel, arrested a young man the other day named Charles Logan, who resides on lot 2, con. 7, Amaranth, on a charge of shooting at his father, Joseph Logan, with intent to kill.
Some boxes drying near the stove in Somerville's factory, Dundas street east, caught fire yesterday morning, but the flames were promptly extinguished by firemen.

The Rev. Mr. Steele, of Point Edward, has been appointed by the Bishop of Huron as incumbent of the parishes of Kirkton, St. Patrick's and Prospect Hill, which constitute the Kirkton Mission of the Episcopal Church.
Mr. F. C. Chittick, son of Mr. W. H. Chittick, of Dorchester Station, who had been visiting his parents, has left for Ottawa to resume his avocation as clerk in the Agricultural Department of the Government.
Mr. Thomas Turnbull, eldest son of James Turnbull, Esq., of Clinton, who has been in the Montreal branch of the Bank of Commerce for some time, has been promoted to the Inspector's Department at Toronto.

As Wm. Marchbanks was leading a Jersey bull home from Bothwell Fair the animal pounced upon him, knocking him down, trampled him, and in other ways made itself disagreeable. Fortunately the injuries were not serious.
While Mr. Joseph Buttery, of Adelaide, was picking apples in his orchard the other day, he had the misfortune to lose his balance and fall from the tree, alighting on his head and shoulders. Luckily, however, no bones were broken.
On Tuesday evening last about thirty of the friends of Mr. W. A. McCutcheon entertained him to an oyster supper at Mr. James McKelvie's Star restaurant at Wingham, prior to his departure for this city. After supper Mr. E. F. Gerster was called to the chair, and Mr. McCutcheon was presented with a nicely worded address and a gold ring. He replied in a feeling manner, and an hour or two was whiled away with speech and song.

On Tuesday afternoon last Mr. D. W. Vary, of Stratford, went up in an apple tree in front of his residence to gather the fruit. LOCAL AND DISTRICT.
The Chief of the St. Thomas Police is satisfied that the man Harris, arrested in this city by P. C. McGowan, is the party who committed the burglaries there, and will visit London, accompanied by a gentleman who can recognize the St. Thomas thief. It appears that on Monday last a man answering the description of Harris put up at the Wilcox House, and registered as Henry Middleton. The same night the burglaries were committed. Middleton remained until Wednesday morning, when he disappeared, leaving two valises behind. He failed to pay his board. Mr. Nunn notified the police, and the Chief searched the valises, and he came satisfied from an examination of their contents that they were stolen. One of them evidently belonged to a man named Val Harrison.

A large number of the inhabitants of Clinton and the surrounding towns and cities assembled at the English Church there on Thursday forenoon to witness the marriage of one of Clinton's fair daughters to a leading merchant of Goderich. Rev. W. Craig officiated. Miss Grace P. Robertson, daughter of Mr. John Robertson, merchant, of Clinton, was united in the bonds of holy wedlock with Mr. A. E. Pridham, of Goderich. The bride-maid was Miss Eva P. Robertson, of Detroit, and Mr. Geo. Nairn acted as groomsmen. The newly married couple will spend their honeymoon in Buffalo, Rochester, Toronto and other cities.

Last Monday the Bishop of the Diocese of London and Council, Very Rev. Dean Wagner, Dr. Kilroy, of Stratford; Dr. O'Connor, of Sandwich College, and others met at the pastoral residence, Windsor. At the time of his week-end with Mr. A. E. Pridham, of Goderich, the bride-maid was Miss Eva P. Robertson, of Detroit, and Mr. Geo. Nairn acted as groomsmen. The newly married couple will spend their honeymoon in Buffalo, Rochester, Toronto and other cities.

The mortuary returns for September show a ratio of 1.17 per 1,000 population in Toronto. Hamilton is the same. London 1.35, and Kingston 1.15. Quebec has the worst record for the month, viz., 3.47; then comes Hull, 3.30. The Montreal figures are 2.84. Galt stands at the very low figure of .68, and St. Thomas .75. Other Ontario cities are Ottawa 2.00, Brantford 1.87, Belleville 1.36, Guelph 1.14, Woodstock 1.03, Brockville 1.47, and Peterboro 1.74.

The Salvation Army Band from Toronto held a grand concert at the barracks, and furnished some exquisite music, which was very much appreciated by the large audience present. Staff-Captain McHardy, an intelligent young printer, has charge of the band, and Staff-Captain Leonard bandmaster. The band boys are the pick of all the Provinces in the Dominion, including Robb, the Welsh minstrel's son.

His Lordship Bishop Baldwin will visit Galt on Tuesday next, 22nd inst. Mrs. Baldwin will accompany him, and will hold a drawing-room meeting at the rectory in the afternoon for the purpose of organizing a branch of the Women's Missionary Auxiliary Society. In the evening the annual missionary meeting will be held in the church, and an address delivered by the Bishop.

The Young Women's Christian Temperance Union met yesterday to complete some arrangements for work and bade farewell to their place of meeting, as their interests will henceforth centre in entirely new surroundings. Thanks are due and are now gratefully tendered to the "W's" for generously allowing them the gratuitous use of their rooms from the organization of the "Y's" until the present.

At Thursday night's meeting of No. 1 Committee, Board of Education, Inspector Boyle reported the Fenton boys, at present under suspension for assaulting another boy at Princess Avenue School. The Committee decided to let them return at the end of the month, their intermissions to be suspended for a month. The results of examinations was considered, but no action in the matter was taken.

The anniversary services of the Wellington Street Methodist Sunday School will be held to-morrow. Services at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. by the Rev. Thomas Cullen, of Saranac, at 2:30 p. m. short addresses will be delivered by the Revs. Mr. Cullen, Mr. Courtice and Mr. Henderson, pastor.

"The Devil's Mine" at the Grand last night drew a good gallery audience, and proved to have blood-curdling qualities enough to satisfy the most exacting admirer of the border drama. It is full of exciting situations, and received hearty applause.

To-morrow the Rev. Canon Davis, of Leamington, will conduct harvest home and thanksgiving services in St. Paul's church in Wingham. On Monday evening he will deliver his celebrated lecture entitled, "What I saw in England, Ireland and Wales."

Auctioneer W. Y. Brunton sold the bankrupt stock of F. Martin, St. Thomas, to Mr. F. Martin, of the same place, yesterday afternoon for 63 cents on the dollar. The stock was a general one, and was evoked at \$5,132.27.
Grain is commencing to move pretty freely about Wingham. On Wednesday, Mr. Wm. Clegg, of that town, shipped three car loads of wheat to Tavistock, and on Thursday five car loads of peas to Liverpool, England.

Charles Rogers, of Chatham, who has been spending the best of his time in goal for two years, owing to his weakness for liquor, has been sentenced to six months in the Central Prison to sober him up.
John Kelly, a man lately employed on C. P. R., was arrested at Appin yesterday and committed to jail by Squires Angus Campbell and John McIntyre. Kelly has no relatives in this country.

Mr. Joseph Meighan, of St. Mary's, recently purchased, from Mr. Thos. Ballantyne, M. P., a fine two-year-old Guernsey bull, for which he paid a handsome figure.
The stone work of the new Wardsville bridge is about completed, and next Wednesday contract for the approaches will be let.

No. 2 Committee of the Board of Aldermen on Thursday night referred the application of W. J. Lucas, to have taxes thrown off some property on account of the street being in bad repair, to No. 1. The Chairman and Engineer were instructed to report on the condition of the C. P. R. crossing on Talbot street. Mr. W. C. L. Gill's petition for improvements in Registry Office was also referred to the Chairman and Engineer. A number of claims for damages, arising out of the M. C. R. running along Bathurst street, were left to the Chairman, Engineer and Mayor. Chas. Barit, having lost \$93 on his Pall Mall street contract, asked the consideration of the Council. Filed. A claim for damages from Mrs. Fitzgibbons was also filed. It was decided to ask the M. C. R. Co. not to allow cars to stand on the streets at noon, and also to draw the attention of the Street Railway Company to the condition. Horton street has been left in.
