Was Wellington ever wounded ? In Lord Stanhope's "Notes of Conversations with the Duke of Wellington" is this passage:-"The Duke spoke of his only wound at Orthez-in the hip; but even that allowed him to continue riding the same day, though not to get over enclosures, etc., as he would usually do. Except that once, he had had balls through his clothes and hat, but not his limbs; he had often been struck, too, but never wounded. "What,' I asked, 'is the distinction?" 'Struck,' he said, 'is from a spent ball, which may often be able to knock a man over and yet do him no injury.' I observed to him how similar had been his fate to Napoleon's in this respect, Napoleon having, I thought, been wounded once only, in the leg also, in the campaign of Ulm.




