G.T.P. DECIDES TO COME THROUGH YELLOWHEAD

Provincial Mineralogist Tells of Resources Along the Chosen Route

MAXWELL SMITH ON FRUIT CROP OUTLOOK

Dominion Inspector Predicts a Large Increase in Yield Next Year

Maxwell Smith, Dominion fruit in spector, arrived from Vancouver Wednesday and registered at the New England hotel. Mr. Smith is here on one of his regulation tours of inspection, and he will in all probability proceed to the north end of the Island tomorrow. "On my last trip," said Mr. Smith

in an interview, "I found the grading of fruit on the market to be well up to the standard, with but few exceptions and these defects I hope to find rectified

and these defects I hope to find rectified on this trip."

Regarding the fruit crop in British Columbia, Mr. Smith said: "It has turned out better than was anticipated. The quality has been exceptionally good, and the high prices realized have more than compensated for any slight shortage in the quantity. For example: In a number of the best fruit growing distitlets in the province, grade. No. I apples have been realizing \$1.25 to \$1.50 per box f. o. b. at shipping points, and this must be considered a very satisfactory return. tory return.

"I am glad to notice, too, that in the planting of new orchards there is a tendency more and more on the part of farmers to confine themselves to a few commercial varieties. This is a step in the right direction. In the Coast districts there are three varieties which excelled this year, namely, "Wealthy," King and Jonathan. These are a good sequence, the Wealthy' being an early apple, the 'King' a medium, and the Jonathan' a late apple, which will keep until the April of the following year.

"Whilst a very large amount of planting has been going on this year, the proportion of orchards coming into bearing has been but small. However, when the young orchards come up in a few years the increase will become very.

"Something of special interest to all fruit growers in British Columbia is the forthcoming tonvention of the Northwest Fruit Growers' association, to be held this year in Seattle. This association is an intenational one, and includes in its membership all the states of the Pacific littoral. Washington, Oregon, California, Utah, Idaho, and British Columbia; and since matters of the first importance will be dealt with by experts of distinction, it is sincerely to be hoped that it will be largely taken advantage of by fruit farmers generally. Addresses and papers will be read upon every phase of the industry; and the discussions which will fellow will probably be by far the most instructive feature of the session. It is also haped that with in the next year or two it may be possible to arrange for the meeting of the convention to be held in British Columbin.

ST. HELENA IS LONELY
