Lonnischen, in a recent edition of the Outlook (New York), describes a situation that is without precedent in history, and one that is of particular interest to Canadians. To-day the Russian co-operative movement has reached a point where it practically stands for a national economic government, representing 13,000,000 heads of families in the consumers co-operative and 4,000,000 individuals in producers and sociations. Producers and consumers stand unequivocally for a universal democracy.

This co-operative development has been one of the most remarkable results of the war, and it is significant that the Allies are attempting to open friendly relations with the Russian people through their co-operative organizations. Kerensty encouraged the co-operatives, but Lenine while refraining from disturbing them attempted to secure some sort of control through the central banking institution of the co-operatives. This movement falled and steps were then taken to autionalize not only the bank, but all the co-operative organizations by force. It was done, but in such a way as


