A MURDER IN PEORIA.

An Official of the Town Charged With Rilling His Father-in-Law.

DEAD BENEATH THE WHEELS.

An Employe of the Michigan Car Works
Killed at Setroft.

Diffeore, Dec 8.—Two young men standing on Junction avenue, near the railway crossing, last evening, while the engine was backing foward the depot to get a passenger train, saw a man roll from under the wheels and signalled the engineer to stop. He did so, and the engineer and fireman, with the two young men, hastened to the body. No one had seen the man previous to his rolling from under the wheels. He was quite dead, having been killed almost instantly. Both legs were broken, scalp badly torn and the chest crushed by the wheels. Subsequently it was discovered that the man's name was Jacob Gelinski, employed in the Michigan Car Works.


