millee: DEAR SIR.-In compliance with resolution of council of March 17, I beg to state that the cost of a two-track viaduct and approaches as per plan approved by the Joint Esplanade Committee, in-cluding station building, amounts to \$2,569,852, and that of a four-track viaduct \$3,303,249. Any alterations or changes which may be ad-visable in connection with the scheme already adopted can only be properly worked out on the ground after arrangements have been made with the owners of property adjoining or affected. I do not, therefore, think it advisable to go into details at present. Suffice to say that the amount stated by me will cover the cost of a structure built generally on the plans proposed.
