The Member for East Lambton in the Legislature.

(From the Globe, March 4.)
Torontonians have long imagined (fondly or otherwise) that there was but one Robert John; but they are mistaken, for the Ontario Legislature is the fortunate possessor of another of that ilk who is as notable in his way as the renowned manager of the Toronto railway, R. J. McCormick, M.P.P. for East Lambton, was one of the surprises of the election of 1908, for he entered the field at the last moment, following the tragic death by suicide of the Liberal candidate first selected, and defeated the sitting Conservative member, Hugh Montgomery, by a majority of 200. Mr. McCormick's first speech in the Legislature is historic. "Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen, I am pleased to see you all here, and I need not say I am pleased to be here. I had a hard time getting here." Thus it began. After discussing rural schools, which were the subject of one or two other subjects dear to his heart, Mr. McCormick concluded: "Thanking you for your kind attention, with these few remarks I will take my seat." From that moment Mr. McCormick possessed the affection of the whole House. Not the least devoted of his admirers is the Prime Minister of the Province, for Mr. McCormick's simple, homely words and quaint, lovable personality found their way direct to Sir James' heart where all the perfect oratory of his supporters or his followers merely left him bored and indifferent. A few months ago, when Sir James was devoted to his residence by a passing illness, Mr. McCormick happened to be in the city, and hearing of the Premier's indisposition, he paid a special visit to the Parliament buildings to get the latest information about the distinguished patient. When Sir James returned to his office he found Mr. McCormick had displayed great concern about his condition, he was genuinely touched by the Liberal member's solicitude. "Why, I must write him a letter," said Sir James. "Where's my secretary? No, on second thoughts, I'll write it myself." And the Premier with his own hand wrote a letter of thanks to the member for East Lambton.

Mr. McCormick's constituents, it is whispered, lose nothing by the personal regard existing between their representative and the head of the Government, for rumor says that Mr. McCormick can obtain as many favors for his riding as he could were he the staunchest of Conservatives. The regard felt by the members for Mr. McCormick is fully shared by the boys of the Press Gallery, and he is always an honored guest at their annual dinner. Last session a little incident occurred, which shows that the Press Gallery, while impervious to bribery, flattery or cajolery from any source, are not averse to obliging a friend. Mr. McCormick, after speaking on the Budget, discovered that he had forgotten to refer to the regrettable accident from which the Provincial Treasurer had suffered in breaking his arm by a fall. The gentle-souled old man feared that he would be deemed lacking in sympathy and he asked if the reporters could rectify the omission. They responded so handsomely to his appeal that in the published reports Mr. McCormick's tribute to the Provincial Treasurer was quite as eloquent and feeling as any delivered on either side of the House.

PLYMPTON COUNCIL.

Plympton Council met Feb. 25th, members all present. Minutes of last meeting read and adopted. Council resolved to try one of the Sarnia road drags or levelers next Saturday, weather permitting. They are built of iron and steel on the split log drag principle and cost \$3.50 each if satisfactory. Council may purchase six or eight. The collector's time

was extended till the first of May. The following accounts were passed: D. Ferguson, gravel sup. Tp. \$19.60; W. H. Scott, " " " " 1.50; J. Rice, spikes for Bear Creek bridge..... 2.60; Municipal World, election outfit. 1.20; At p. m. Council resumed Court of Revision on the Stewart assessment, M. A. Weir, Barrister of Sarnia, being present. Messrs. Scott, Evans and Douglas presented more evidence in support of their appeal and a number of witnesses in defence were examined and testified to the contrary. At 5.30 the court adjourned to March 4th to consider their verdict. Council met March 4th at 10 a. m., to read and consider the report of the engineer on the Perche creek drain in Sarnia Township, lands in the first and second concessions of Plympton being assessed \$588 for this work.
