The Berwick evaporating plant of Graham's Limited commenced operations on Thursday, under the management of H. A. Thackster. Providing sufficient supplies can be obtained, it is the intention of the Company, we understand, to keep the plant in operation throughout the fall and winter months. About thirty-five hands are at present employed by this concern.—(Berwick Register).

Some idea of the extent of the fruit industry in this section of the Valley may be obtained from the fact that of six fruit warehouses now being operated in Berwick, a total of ninety hands are at present employed. And this number, we understand, will likely be considerably augmented as the season advances. In addition to the warehouses, the Evaporator, which is now in operation, has a staff of thirty-five employees, while Sam Chute, whose extensive orchards are situated in the South Berwick and Rockland districts, are employing no less than sixty men during the apple picking season.—(Register).
