Any member holding a high tgrade bone, ficiary certificate or policy may changelfor a lower one by surrendering his certificate e noiseisceek edt no noitsiligga anisam bus regular printed forms for a lower grade certificate through his branch Recording Secretary, who shall immediately forward said heneficiary certificate and application to the Grand Secretary, and thereafter he shall pay assessments according to grade of cer. tificate applied for, and according to his age at the date of his initiation.
