from which tho blood might be successively allowed to reenter the general circulation if the patient threatened to bleed to death. This, however, is only an idea; the possibility of carrying it into practice must be determined by careful experimiont on animals and on man.

I indulge in the hope that this proceeding may still be found capabie of applicatiou in many directions.
In conclusion, there must remain one question of the greatest importanco in relation to its introduction into practice; namely, whether its uso is not connected also with disadvantago to the health of the pationt. Certainly wo cannot, without further consideration, set aside the possibility of the fact that prolonged and firm compression of a limb may be followed by dangerous disturbances of the circulation and innervation, such as thrombosis, inflammation, paralygis, \&o. - Nevertholess, after the thousands of expeirments which surgeons of all times and countries bavo made with the tourniquett and with digital compression, it was bearcely probable that uven total compression should bring in its train thoso evils, if it were not of too long duration. And whilo the classical experimental researchos of Cohnheim have shown that, in warm-blooded auimals, the total intorvipition of tho oironlation is gonerally not fullowed by any lauthy diaturbince, if it had not been continued for more than six or eight hours, I also, after having, during the present year, performed more than eighty operations on parts rendered artificially anomic, can assure you that in not one case have I seen any disturbances occur such-as might be feared as tho result of the procceding. I have performek oporations which bave occupied an hour, and have not found that any disturbance whatever of the circulation took place during the process of healing; on the contrary, since I have employed this method, the operation-wounds have always had a remarkably favourable course, and the occurrence of accidental traumatic discase has been quite the exception. There is only one precaution which I would strongly urge you to observe in the employment of this method. When you operate on the parts that are the seat of putrid infiltration, you must not attempt to deprive them entirely of blood. If you tightly bandage parts that are in this condition. you run the risk of pressing the infectious matter into the meshes of the areolar tissne and into the lymphatics, and of thus probably inducing very mischievous results. In such cases I do not apply the bandage, but content myself, before tying the compressor round the limb, with emptying it of blood as much as possible by holding it in an elevated position for some moments- [Translated from the German.-London Medical Record.

The urelhra, abnormally dilated, esisily admitted ths finger into the bladder, when shand, voluminous body was felt. The woman stated that on account of the great difficulty she had in
making water, sho hud passed a candlo into the urothra, and it had slipped into tho bladdor. It was removed with a pair of forceps, and spoedy recovery followed.

Sir Henry bad taken his usual holiday far a-field, in the autumn; he had boon journeying in Russia. The other wrek he was a prominent figure for a day at the trial of Marahal Bax aine in Paris, and dined with zome of the judgos in the ovening. Ho retarned to Iondon by way of Folkstone on Saturday, did not go ont on Sunday (not fealing very well), and died quictly in his bed on Monday afternoon on the day on which he hed complotod his eighty-fifthe year. Thas to the last this remarkablo man prosorvod his intalloctual and physical activity, and fitly closed a carcer which he hae himself wall, described, and which wres full of interseet and of excellent and high example.
