later this day, will the minister assure the House that the federal government will respond to this provincial initiative and take action that will put off completion of the takeover bid until consultation has taken place between the federal government and the government of Manitoba?

**Mr. Speaker:** Order, please. It seems to me that the question asked by the hon. member is at least partly hypothetical and can be considered as a representation. Perhaps we might be allowed to go to the next question.

**Mr. Broadbent:** On a point of order, Mr. Speaker, as this takeover bid affects in a serious way a couple of thousand employees and as another government in Canada, the government of Manitoba, is concerned about the takeover, I wonder, notwithstanding the improper phrasing of the question, if the minister, who got the sense of the question, could be permitted to answer?

**Mr.** Andras: Mr. Speaker, again I confirm that a few minutes before the question period my information was that we had not received such representations from the government of Manitoba, but I most certainly will recheck that and in the event that is the case we will certainly respond. I could not make an unequivocal commitment to stop this acquisition because Bill C-132 is not yet law. I am encouraged however, as I think the hon. member might be, to note that the principals are voluntarily submitting their detailed proposals to the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce and are prepared to consult and, I hope, to be influenced by the response.

# CAUGHNAWAGA RESERVE—DIFFICULTIES BETWEEN NATIVES AND WHITE PEOPLE

**Mr. René Matte (Champlain):** Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a question to the hon. Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development.

Could he advise the House of the steps he will take concerning the serious problems which the Mohawk Indians and the white people are facing in Caughnawaga?

Hon. Jean Chrétien (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Mr. Speaker, this morning, I met Chief Kirby of the Caughnawaga Reserve. Under the Indian Act, the Indian people on this reserve, like those on any other reserve for that matter, have the right to pass bylaws concerning non-Indians living on the reserve. This is exactly what the council intends to do. They intend to pass this bylaw which will become effective within 40 days. If people believe it is not fair they could appeal to courts. It is impossible for me under the circumstances to act like a judge in this matter.

**Mr**. **Matte:** Has the minister received complaints from young Indians who, with the support of older ones, would disapprove entirely of the band council which they would consider a creature of the federal government?

[Mr. Broadbent.]

Mr. Chrétien: Mr. Speaker, it is the elected council of Caughnawaga which is recognized by the federal government under the Indian Act. The hereditary chiefs do not enjoy such status under the law. Some provisions of the act would enable them to exercise efficient control were they in majority within the Caughnawaga band, but apparently this is not so at the present time.
