NORTHEASTERN SASKATCHEWAN FARMERS—FLOOD COMPENSATION

Mr. Lorne Nystrom (Yorkton-Melville): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Agriculture. About four or five weeks ago in this House he said that Treasury Board would be considering some assistance for the farmers in northeast Saskatchewan who were flooded out last summer. Did the Minister get that through Treasury Board, will there be assistance to those farmers, and why is it taking so long?

Hon. John Wise (Minister of Agriculture): Mr. Speaker, in response to the Hon. Member's question, I can appreciate his interest in the matter. I did not think it was four or five weeks ago that I made that statement. I might put his mind at ease. We have completed the calculations on the Saskatchewan Manitoba excess water compensation. We are in the final stages of assessing a similar compensation payment to the Province of Quebec. I hope to be in a position, within a matter of a very few days, to make a positive announcement with respect to both.
