

A Union Jack—a Flag Ship.

Man-of-War Screw Steamer, steamer penant, *over* the Union Jack.

Man-of-War Paddle Steamer, steamer penant *under* the Union Jack.

Troop Ship, white penant two blue crosses between steamer penant and Union Jack.

Dominion blue Ensign, under steamer penant, Dominion Government Steamer.

Foreign Men-of-War are denoted in the same manner as English, excepting that the particular National Ensign is substituted for the Union Jack.

A red flag pierced white, Royal Mail Packet from England. } Fort-

A blue and red four quarters, with white ball in upper blue } nightly
quarter, mail for England. } line.

A blue flag white centre, from England. } Weekly line.

A blue and white four quarters, for England. }

A white flag, pierced blue, Newfoundland mail.

A white flag, pierced red, Bermuda mail.

White penant with blue ball in centre—a Steamer.

A blue penant—a Ship.

A blue and white penant—a Barque.

A red penant—a Brig.

A red and white penant—a Brigantine.

A white penant—a three or more masted schooner, or any schooner wearing Private Signal.

Yellow flag above descriptive penant denotes Quarantine.

A vessel in distress—large ball at masthead with descriptive penant underneath.

A blue flag with white letter R in centre is hoisted at the masthead for 1 hour, on receipt of the news of the arrival of the mail steamer at Rimouski. When the news is received during the night the flag will be hoisted from 8 a. m. to 9 a. m. in the morning.

BY NIGHT.

Steamers only are signalled, and are distinguished as follows, viz :—

A *Red* and *white* light, horizontal, the red light to the Eastward, denotes a Steamer East reported.

A *Green* and *white* light, horizontal, the green light to the Westward, denotes a Steamer West reported.

When a Steamer is sighted from citadel the white light is taken down.

When two or more Steamers are reported, the red or green is dropped 12 feet.

When two or more Steamers are sighted, the red or green light is shown dropped twelve feet.

Red light above *white*, 12 feet apart, mail from England. } Fort-

Green light above *white*, 12 feet apart, mail for England. } nightly.

Red light above *red*, 12 feet apart, mail from England. } Weekly.

White light above *white*, 12 feet apart, mail for England. }

White light above *red*, 12 feet apart, Newfoundland mail.

White light above *green*, 12 feet apart, Bermuda mail

Green light above *red*, 12 ft apart, English Man-of-War from westward.

Red light above *green*, 12 ft apart, English Man-of-War from eastward.

Red, green and *white*, 12 ft. apart, Foreign Man-of-War from eastward.

Red, green and *white*, 12 ft apart, Foreign Man-of-War from westward.

A *red* triangular flag is hoisted at the masthead between 7 a. m. and 9 a. m. when a Royal Mail Steamer arrives from England during night.
