forthwith remove and bury the same, then such dead animal shall be removed and buried by the Head Constable at the public expence; but this shall not release the party offending, when discovered, from the said penalty, together with the reimbursement

of such expence.

ART. 11—No person shall gallop on horseback or in any carriage, or go faster than a moderate trot in turning any corner, nor in any square street or lane in any part of the city or suburbs; nor ride or stand, on any part of the foot pavement, on horseback, or with a carriage; nor leave any horse tied in the street to any house or across the foot path; nor ride on the foot path of the Glacis, nor wilfully run against any person or his or her horse or carriage, under a penalty not exceeding forty shillings nor less than ten shillings for each offence, besides being responsible for any damage or injury the person committing the offence shall have occasioned.

ART. 12—All persons opening holes in the ice, whether on the Great River or the Little River, if the same be above fifteen inches in diameter, shall cause them to be surrounded with pickets, in such manner as may prevent any risk of persons or cattle falling therein, under the penalty of ten shillings; and any person who shall remove or carry off any of such pickets.

ets shall incur a like penalty.

ART. 13—No horses, hogs or goats shall be suffered to go at large or to stray in any of the streets, equares or lanes of the city or suburbs, under the penalty of five shillings; and whenever any such animals shall be found at large and straying, as aforesaid, it shall and may be lawful for any person to seize and detain them until the owner or owners of them shall have paid the said penalty for every horse, hog or goat so detained, over and above the reasonable charges for keeping them. And the person so seizing and detaining any animal, as aforesaid, shall cause the same to
