The interests of these sections adjoining the city in the townships are practically identical with the city, and I see no reason why some co-operative plan should not be adopted for the mutual benefit of all the municipalities. So far as big improvements are concerned there would certainly be a big saving in expense.

"Of course there are a lot of things that will have to be worked out gradually," he concluded. "We can't just jump at a plan like that, but I'd be in favor of having a conference and trying to work something out along these lines."
