SOCCER PLAYERS TO HONOR WRECK DEAD

Will Wear Crepe and Hold Church Parade—Insurance Scheme on Hand.

The meeting of the T. & D. Council on Monday did not end until the wee small hours of the morning, with the result that the fact of the meeting having just come to hand. The insurance fund was discussed, and all the clubs were requested to report back on Monday next to a special meeting. The council would like to see a thousand players take the proposition up and if the required number do so the council are prepared to declare a benevolent fund of ten dollars per week for five weeks to any injured players. In memory of the recent catastrophe to the Empress of Ireland the players in the T. & D. on Saturday will wear crepe on their arms, and on Sunday next they will hold a parade to one of the downtown churches. Cricket Headquarters Changed to Montreal

Winnipeg, Man., June 2.—Western cricketers may secede from the Dominion body. At the annual meeting of the Canadian Cricket Association here last night, a vote, chiefly by proxy, made Montreal the Dominion headquarters for the year, and as this was in direct opposition to the spirit of the annual meeting of 1913, the "western" officers are considerably peeved. In 1911 it was decided that two consecutive international matches should be played at the headquarters of the association before such quarters should be moved to the next choice. President Macdonald, who attended the annual meeting of the C.C.A. at Toronto in 1911, produced documents last night which went to show that the headquarters should remain in Winnipeg another year.

It is suggested that they either boom or rope it as done at Henley, and the small craft can line-up behind the ropes, and in no way interfere with the regatta. It is to be hoped that the harbor commission act on this good suggestion at once and have the course in the best possible shape for the big annual regatta on July 1 on the Hallow Memorial Course.
