## FASHION DECREES REVIVAL IN FANS

Evening Toilet Incomplete  
Without This Gem-Studded  
or Many-Hued Accessory.

## PLUMES ARE POPULAR

Curled Ostrich or Gloriously  
Tinted Peacock Feathers Are  
Freely Used.

In harmony with the picturesque modes favored this season for evening wear quite a revival in fans is noted. In fact, so essential is this accessory now considered that the evening toilette is not complete without the little fan, gem-studded or blazing, with many tined feathers. Conspicuous among the newest designs are the one-time favored fans of soft curled ostrich or gloriously tinted peacock feathers.

Because of the ever-increasing vogue for black frocks, the large black feather fans are particularly effective—mounted with jet and touches of silver or rhinestone ornaments. Enamelled wood sticks are shown with the peacock fans, while oddly carved frames in wood, ivory and enamel designs enhance dainty little models in silks, nets, laces and metallic gauze materials. The hand-painted fan in new shades of rose, violet and blue with touches of gold, silver or bronze is very popular and chosen mostly by the dance enthusiast who often carries it suspended on a slender chain.

A tiny French fan intended for the young girl had a frame of carved and pierced ivory. The fan was made of gold brocade, also studded with semi-precious stones and attached to a slim gold chain.

Quite oriental in coloring and design are some of the fans for open wear, while Japanese designs are very modern when carried with the exquisite dinner gowns richly brocaded in these effects.

## FESTIVAL OF HANUKKAH COMMENCES TONIGHT

Legend of Feast Day is One of  
Most Beautiful in Hebrew  
Religion.

The eight-day festival of Hanukkah will commence in the homes of every orthodox Jew in Toronto at sundown this evening. The Hanukkah is one of the minor Jewish festivals, but it originated in the second century and its legend is one of the most beautiful in the Hebrew religion. At sunset a candle will be lighted in each home on a large candelstick, with eight branches instead of seven. On Friday night two candles will be lighted and on Saturday three and so on until eight candles are lit.

In Toronto a holiday was proclaimed at sunset last night, but it ends at sunrise today, so that it does not in any way interfere with work.

## CHURCH UNION CHANCES GROW GRADUALLY LESS

Presbyterian Vote Coming in Indicates It May Not Have Majority.

Church union will not be effected for some time according to the opinions voiced by prominent Presbyterian ministers after the completion of the vote on this question Tuesday night. The result will not be known for some time. It is agreed that the vote will be very even, and that even the those in favor of union win out, there will be such a large percentage against it that the assembly will not take any steps this year. Several ministers stated that church union was inevitable and that it was only a matter of time.

Rev. R. P. MacKay said that union would come sooner or later, although he did not think that any steps would be taken in that direction as a result of this ballot. Rev. D. McTavish was also in favor of union. Rev. E. Winchester was of the opinion that the movement would receive its quietus and would not come up again for many years.

## FLOOD OF PROSPERITY SWEEPING THRU WEST

Merchants Restocking Stores and Settlers Are Buying Lard.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—J. G. Turfitt, M.P. for Amherst, who returned from a trip to the west today, gives a glowing account of conditions in the three prairie provinces. He says that business is doing heavily, which explains the big increase in customs receipts. A great deal of land is being sold at low prices. The crop, Mr. Turfitt says, is growing every day. Farmers have from ten to fifteen bushels more per acre than they expected. An immense lot of stock is being lifted. In many cases farmers are paying both principal and interest on their mortgages.

## CALLS CONDITIONS UNIQUE AND IDEAL

Rev. Father Burke Tells Federation of Alumnae of Toronto University.

## CANADIAN HEADS POLL

Miss M. L. Hart is Elected to Newly-Created Office of Trustee.

At the recent meeting of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae held at the Sherman House, Chicago, Rev. Thos. F. Burke, C. P., late rector of Newman Hall, Toronto, was the principal speaker at the formal luncheon of the sessions.

In the course of his address Father Burke referred to higher education as it exists in Ontario, pointing out the University of Toronto, with its central college and affiliated institutions, University college, as the centre of the group, Victoria for the Methodist body, Trinity for the Anglicans, and St. Michael's for the Catholics, all having equal rights and affiliation. The conditions existing under this arrangement were, in the mind of the speaker, unique and ideal. He said he knew of no similar instance anywhere in the world.

Many Torontonians There. About seven hundred delegates and their friends from many parts of the United States and Canada were guests at the luncheon at which Father Burke spoke. Among those from Toronto were Mrs. H. T. Kelly, vice-president of the international federation; Mrs. Ambrose Small, governor for Ontario; Mrs. Emma O'Sullivan, delegate from Loreto Abbey; Miss M. L. Hart, delegate from St. Joseph's college; Miss Mary O'Brien and Miss Mary MacMahon, Rev. W. L. Hart of Morton, Minnesota, an old Toronto boy, was present on the first day of the convention.

A feature of the proceedings was the introduction of the new office of trustees, five being appointed and one of the officers coming to Canada. The delegates showing their good will to the Dominion by putting Miss Hart, the Canadian representative, at the head of the poll. Miss Madeline Small was one of the delegates from Toronto.

## GETS ANOTHER CHANCE.

In the county criminal court yesterday, Judge Winchester allowed William O'Reilly, convicted of receiving stolen goods, to go on suspended sentence, O'Reilly's sister furnished bonds to the extent of \$100 to guarantee his good conduct. The rings were stolen from J. A. Dixon.

Much interest has been aroused by the two days' sale of exquisite furnishings and ornaments of two large estates conducted personally by Chas. M. Henderson on his premises, 128 East King street. Large crowds were present both days. The bidding was excellent and the sales totaled over \$17,000, showing that the Toronto public is taking advantage of this satisfactory means of securing superior goods at extremely reasonable prices. Yesterday's auction began at 11 o'clock and by 3 o'clock everything on the lists had been sold—in all about 550 articles.

One of the most beautiful pieces put up for auction was a Louis XVI. drawing-room cabinet, inlaid marquetrie and ornamented with exquisite Sevres panels. This brought \$70. Two handsome and beautifully topped Persian rugs sold at \$175 and \$140. A water color of Antwerp harbor, painted in 1902 by T. H. V. Mastenboeck, went for the sum of \$180. Bidding was keen for several pieces of exquisite inlaid mahogany bedroom furniture, which were nearly all purchased by W. H. Guest. The Sheraton bedstead brought \$50, the dressing bureau \$53. An oil painting by A. Suzor Cote, entitled "Les Peupliers de la Ferme Baron," sold for \$95, and another of local interest, painted by F. McGillivray, known as "The Old Mill," went for \$75. A very quaint empire-shaped cabinet in gilt with heavy ornate mounts and decorated with wattlework panels, brought \$50.

## NO CRIMINAL INTENT.

W. E. Clarke appeared before Judge Winchester in the criminal court yesterday afternoon, charged with obtaining by false pretences \$658 from W. A. Longhurst. Longhurst stated that he invested the money in a hot water heater and vacuum steam trap, and that Clarke gave him the understanding the invention was patented. Clarke said that the application had been made to the patent, and Judge Winchester decided there had been no criminal intent and dismissed the case.

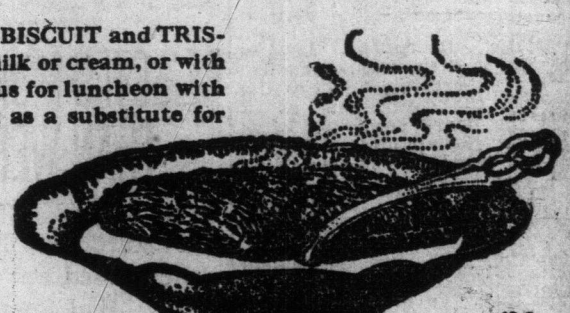

## NEUTRAL VESSELS ARE STOPPED BY GERMANS

Enemy Preaches One Thing, But Is Practicing Another.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The foreign office today publishes a statement which it announces was made by the captain of a Swedish steamer to the effect that, before the sailing of a vessel, Swedish custom houses in all cases telegraph to Berlin information of the sailing, and that the vessel does not carry contraband; and that all Swedish vessels leaving the Baltic are stopped at the entrance to the Sound by German patrol boats, which examine the vessels very carefully. In making public the statement, the foreign office appends the following observations:

"The above appears to be the majesty's government to meet being brought to the notice of the public as showing how the German Government in these waters, where they have any opportunity for displaying naval activity, practice the principle of the freedom of the seas for neutral commerce which they have so loudly accused his majesty's government of violating."

## WILLS PROBATED

In the surrogate court yesterday the will of Robert Norman of Schomberg, formerly a warden in York County who died Oct. 26 last, has been filed for probate. The estate is valued at \$16,250.

"To my son, Hugh Norman. I give my gold-headed cane and to my grandson, Douglas Catts, my watch and chain," reads in part the will, dated Dec. 23, 1913.

To his widow, Mrs. Janet Norman, the testator left the household goods, the life insurance and \$8000 in trust and a life interest in the residue of the estate. To his daughters, Mrs. Effie Catts, Mrs. Myrtle Blackadar and Mrs. Rubens Amos, each \$1000, and to his friend, Lorne Ellison of Schomberg, \$10. On the death of the widow, the estate is to be equally divided between the four children, Hugh, Effie, Myrtle and Rubens.

George Dunham, a manufacturer's agent, who died on Nov. 19, left an estate worth \$1558. The widow, Jane W. Dunham, receives all the estate.

## PEMBROKE IS FULL OF GERMAN SPIES

Sensational Charges Are Made by Mayor Morris.

PEMBROKE, Ont., Dec. 1.—Mayor L. Morris states that this town, situated near the Petawawa military camp and with 1200 German residents, is the centre of a German spy system which radiates thru Canada.

The mayor asserts that no efforts have been made by the authorities to round up the ultra-German element. Mayor Morris attributes the apparent negligence to party politics. A Conservative himself, he holds that both parties are equally to blame. Each, he says, is afraid to disturb the German population for fear of handing itself when election time comes along.

## FIST FIGHT BETWEEN ROUMANIAN FACTIONS

PARIS, Dec. 1.—"Partisans and adversaries of the government" came to blows at the opening session of the Roumanian Parliament. Telegraphs the Roumanian correspondent of the "Matin," King Ferdinand had barely begun to read his speech, when he was interrupted with cries of "Down with the government!" from M. Mile, leader of the interventionists, and his adherents.

The supporters of the government replied with cheers for the king, whose title was pronounced through by shouts of opposition.

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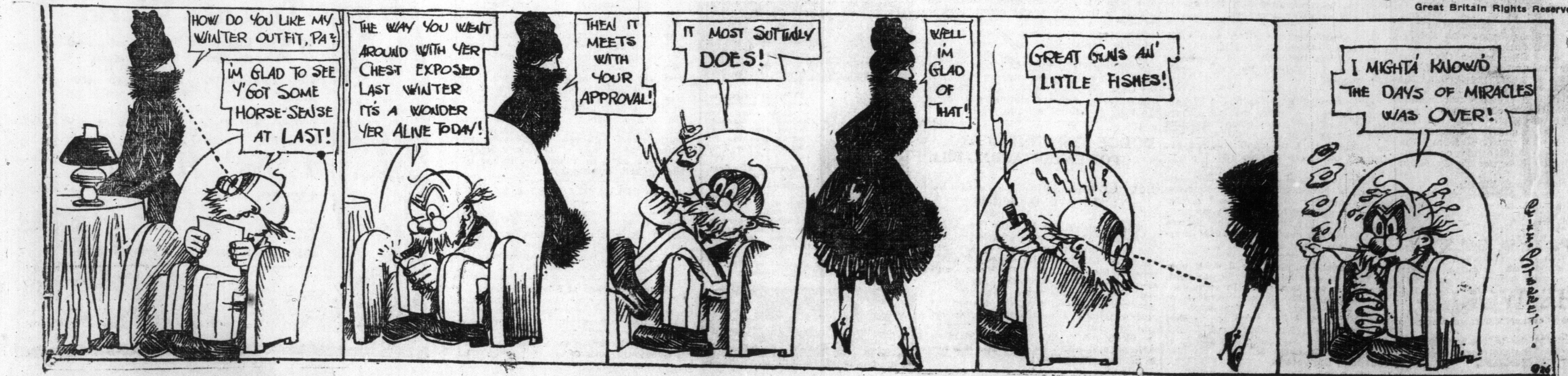
