cither German or Stranger can require. This is fo clear, fo full, so much incapable of being subverted or overturned by any little Strokes of Casuistry, that I venture to affirm whoever should undertake to prove the contrary, would meet with the Contempt of dery Briton. You need not, therefore, wonder that we look upon the Succession of the Queen of Hungary as a thing founded upon Laws human and divine, and not to be altered or destroyed, but by the direct Breach of both.

This plain State of the Matter of Fact, shews, how little Foundation there is for all that has been faid about the Obstinacy and Intractability of the Queen of Hungary. Her Majesty had evidently an absolute Right to the Whole of her Father's Dominions, and could not possibly give up the fmallest Part, without giving up, in some meafure, her Right to the Whole; because the Prefervation of the Austrian Succession entire and indivisible, is the Motive that induced the Diet of the Empire to convert the Pragmatick Sanction, which was no more than an Oeconomical Constitution, into a Law of the Empire, from which, therefore, she could not depart, without departing from her Right to the Empire's Guaranty. To fay, therefore, that the Queen of Hungary has refused, and still refuses to listen to any Terms of Accommodation, founded on the giving any Satisfaction to the House of Bavaria, or any other Pretenders, is faying no more than that she is inflexibly just, that she adheres to the Laws of her Country, and that she will not be frighted into doing what she ought not, what, perhaps, she cannot do. There is a wide Difference, Sir, a very wide Difference between contending for what one conceives to

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
