The settlement achieved by Judge Barron in the case of the Grand Trunk strikers does not seem to meet with very

ers does not seem to meet with very great approval in labor circles.

A year since, the conductors and trainmen went on strike, and after a great deal of discussion returned to work. Some 222 were refused employment by the company, and an appeal for an investigation was made to the Dominion Government. Sittings were held all over the system, and a report was made to the company embracing recommendations, which were not acted upon.

The nearing elections caused the matter to be hurried, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. W. Mackenzie King, fearing that it might enter into politics, made an appeal to the company to have the matter to Montreal and effected a partial settlement, but from all indications, locally, the terms are not yet satisfactory. Of the 222 who appealed for an investigation, only 91 are to be reinstated.

The company refused to take back the yardmasters, holding that they had poright to sympathize with the men. Twenty-two men had previously been reinstated.
