Two Men Acknowledged to Be in the Lead for Presidential Republican Candidate.

Special to The Toronto World. Washington, Dec. 8.—Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois and General Leonard Wood are acknowledged to be in the lead for the presidential nomination when the Republican national committee meets here Wednesday.

BOLSHEVIKI PRESENT TERMS OF PEACE TREATY

Copenhagen, Dec. 8.—The correspondence of the New York Times reveals that the peace conditions presented by the Russian Bolsheviki to the Estonians include recognition of the Soviet government, amnesty for political prisoners, the resumption of diplomatic and commercial relations, the disbandment of foreign troops whose presence constitutes a danger to peace, unhindered commercial traffic through Estonian territory and the use of Estonian ports.

SENATE TO DEFER ACTION ON TREATY

HARD WORK ONLY CAN SAVE RUSSIA

Prime Minister Tretiakoff Appeals for Co-operation to Fight Bolshevism.

Brusilov, Dec. 8.—The vice-prime minister, Serge Tretiakoff, in an interview with the representatives of the press, said: "The new government will emancipate itself from personal intrigues and party interests. The only way out of the chaos is through the hard work of the people. Only this Russia can be saved. We will continue our struggle against the Bolsheviks until they are menaced not only to Russia but to the entire world as well."
