

SOLDIERS WITH BAYONETS CLEAR STREETS OF RIOTERS

Militia Takes Active Measures to Prevent Interference With Street Railway.

Winnipeg, March 30.—The city was quieter this morning after yesterday's outbreaks. Six cars were sent out at 6 o'clock, loaded with police, detectives and strike-breakers. These were kept running up and down Main-street, no attempt being made to carry passengers. Crowds started to get very thick on Main-street early in the afternoon. About 3 o'clock a car was stopped near the subway, the strike-breakers were forced to leave the car and were pretty roughly handled. Stones and missiles of all kinds were hurled at the car until it resembled a wreck. The C.M.R., fully armed, and with a Maxim gun were ordered out and marched to the scene of the disturbance. The Riot Act was read, the soldiers fixed bayonets and charged the crowd. They cleared the crowd off the street for one block from Logan to Henry-street, on Main-street, near the C.P.R. station, and with the assistance of the police formed a cordon clear across the street at each end of the block with a Maxim gun in the centre and no one was allowed to pass the lines. The few cars that were running were taken to the barns at 8 p.m. and the troops withdrawn. Mayor Sharpe was hooted and jeered while reading the Riot Act, and later, when he and City Solicitor Hunt attempted to board a car, they were mistaken for strikers by Thiel, a detective on board the car, and he used his baton on them and was placed under arrest. The 9th Regiment have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness, and are parading to-night. The Manitoba Dragoons of Portage la Prairie have also been notified to be ready for instant service in case of necessity. The mayor received a reply from the company this morning, refusing the offer of arbitration he submitted to them yesterday. He has ordered the company that they must keep their cars moving. There is a rumor that the electricians at the power-house will walk out unless the strike is settled, which would leave the city in total darkness to-night.

MERRITTON IN LINE.

May Take Over Mill Plants and Develop Electricity.

St. Catharines, March 30.—(Special.)—At a mass meeting of the citizens of Merrittton, called for the purpose of discussing ways and means of advertising the municipality, a citizens' committee was appointed, composed of A. R. Thompson, Dr. Vanderburg, Robt. Daw, James Hander, John Conlon, Charles Urlicker, James B. Dolan, W. H. Wilson, J. K. Bradley, Edward Inwood and the following manufacturers: John McLean, James Wilson, Earl Riddon, J. S. Hara, W. D. Woodruff and D. D. McTavish. It may be that the municipality will take over one or two mill plants having excellent water powers and develop electrical power to be sold to manufacturers at very low prices.

CRAZY ITALIAN CREATES STIR

Flourishes Revolver in Train and Three Times Attempts Suicide.

Niagara Falls, March 30.—A crazy Italian made quite a stir on Grand Trunk train No. 8 at 4 o'clock this morning, when the train was approaching this station. He jumped up in his seat and flourished a loaded revolver over the heads of the sleeping passengers in the day coach in a threatening manner, at the same time making all kinds of loud utterances in his native language, and then ran to the end of the car and leaped thru the glass door of the vestibule when near Clifton Junction. He afterwards tried to jump from the bridge into the rapids, and when locked up on the American side, attempted to hang himself with his braces. He has \$600 and a ticket to Italy.

GUILD OF CIVIC ART.

Fund of \$1500 for Plan for Improvement of City. The Toronto Guild of Civic Art held its annual meeting last night in the Engineers' Club-rooms. The meeting was largely attended and much interest was evidenced. In the absence of the president, Sir H. M. Pellatt, Vice-President R. Y. Ellis took the chair. The report of the civic plan committee showed that about \$1500 had been collected by subscription and extended in preparing a comprehensive plan for the improvement of the city. Further work was reported necessary before this plan would be ready to submit and was ordered to be pushed on with vigor. The report of the committee on the decorations of the entrance to the parliament buildings showed that the guild had been brought to bear by the government to take the necessary steps and the work is expected to be proceeded with at once. The old advisory board were re-elected. Controller Shaw was present and expressed his approbation of the work of the guild.
