MINING TAX 3 PER CENT. ON PROFITS OVER \$10,000

Sliding Scale Abandoned - Tax on Natural Gas Precipitates Public Ownership Debate.

In the legislature yesterday the Mining Tax Bill passed committee, the figures of the tax being announced at three per cent, upon all profits over \$10,000 and two cents per acre for acreage tax. The whole of the contemplated sliding scale is thus done away with, and the principle of a graded tax is abandoned.
