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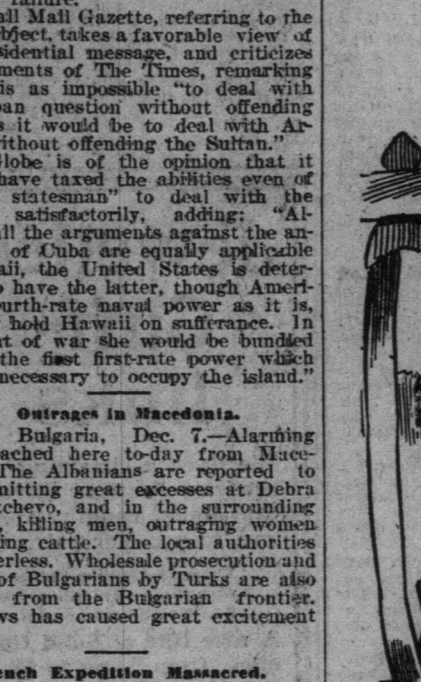

AND TROUBLE IS BREWING IN THE LIBERAL WIGWAM.

MUTTERINGS IN THE RANKS

BECAUSE MESSRS. TARTE, BLAIR AND FITZPATRICK HAVE SO MUCH SAY.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER'S SUPPORTERS AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ANTI-GRUBBING AMONG THE FAITHFUL—SIR ADMIRAL CHAPLEAU'S PROPOSED SECOND TERM AT SPENCERWOOD IS THE FIRST AND GREATEST.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—(Special.)—A despatch from Quebec to The Star says: "Just what the outcome was at the conference to which the political gentlemen also above named engaged, has, of course, not been divulged by any who were a party to the secrets there discussed, but the feeling among the majority of the Liberal members of the Legislature here, and local politicians generally, is that the re-appointment of Sir Adolphe Chapleau for a new term of five years is probable. If this impression proves to be correct, there will be the greatest dissatisfaction among the Liberals of this province, a dissatisfaction which may take the form of an actual split in the party here. This statement was made to me this morning by several prominent Liberal members of the Legislature. While at the present juncture none of the Liberal members who have spoken care to have their names made public, they had no hesitation in expressing themselves very strongly in opposition to the re-appointment of Sir Adolphe Chapleau, and that, if Sir Adolphe Chapleau were re-appointed, there would be trouble."

"Why, then, ask you," said one Liberal member, "the Liberal party is supposed to be in power at Ottawa, yet a member of the Party of Tory politicians here all the say in the Council chamber and in running the affairs of the Government?"

"There is Mr. Tarte, an old-time Tory; there is Mr. Blair, as much Tory as Liberal; there is Mr. Fitzpatrick, who was expelled from the Liberal caucus when Mr. Marchand was leader of the Opposition, with whom the gentlemen who have all the say at Ottawa."

"And the result," added another Liberal member, "we have to mention only an instance here and there; Mr. McDonald promoted still higher on the intercolonial; Sir Adolphe getting another term, a second term, and so on. Mr. Tarte, or Mr. Blair, or Mr. Fitzpatrick, has some personal interest in it."

CAUSING A HEAP OF TROUBLE

SIR WILFRID AND HIS GOVERNMENT ARE HAVING A LOT OF WORRY OVER THE MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION.

Ottawa, Dec. 7.—(Special.)—There is no doubt that the Manitoba school question is causing a lot of trouble to the Premier and the Government, and it is in all probability, according to Mr. Fitzpatrick, the Solicitor-General, is pressing upon the Premier the acceptance of his resignation. It will be remembered that Mr. Fitzpatrick's resignation was accepted by the Premier on the 21st of October, and that Mr. Fitzpatrick, after pledging himself to his constituents as a member of the Conservative Party, was not granted to the Catholic minority in Manitoba the concession which he had promised, and also his seat in the Government.
