Col. Joseph M. Bennett Dies of

Col. Joseph M. Bennett Dies of Bright's Disease.

Philadelphia, Sept. 29,—Col. Joseph M. Bennett, a philanthropist, died this morning at his home in this city of Bright's disease, aged \$2 years.

Col. Bennett began his work of philanthropy in 1880, when he donated 40 acres, in what is now a section of Fairmont Park, valued at \$400,000, for the erection of the Methodist Orphanage, and afterwards contributed largely to its support. He also donated valuable properties to the University of Pennsylvania, the Deaf and Dumb Institute and the Methodist Deaconesses. His property is said to be worth \$3,000,000, and it is estimated that Col. Bennett's charity amounted to \$1,000,000.
