GERMAN SOLDIERS HAVE BEEN TOLD ARMISTICE IS ALREADY ARRANGED

(Special to The Advertiser, Copyrighted, 1918, New York Tribune, Inc.) WITH THE AMERICAN ARMIES IN THE FIELD, Oct. 16 .- The lements of the German army opposing the Americans have been told that all plans for an armistice and the withdrawal from the occupied territory have now been arranged. The plan embraces the withdrawal of the German troops twenty kilometres, while the Allied armies withdraw ten kilometres. Then with a neutral strip of thirty kilometres between the armies the general withdrawal commences, the Allied armies halting ten kilometres from the German frontiers until peace is signed.

An American sergeant, captured by the Germans Wednesday, was taken a considerable distance to the German rear by his captors, given biscuits and liquor rations, and then turned loose. His captors said that the war would soon be over and they didn't want to bother with prisoners. The sergeant rejoined our lines at darkness without difficulty.
