BATTLING NELSON FINDS GREAT METHOD TO COLLECT OLD DEBTS

Rumor That "Bat" Was down and Out Was Only a Bluff and Brought Him In a Nice Bank Roll—Stories Told About Ex-Fighters.

Those who were wont to insist that Battling Nelson lacked a sense of humor perhaps are chanting a different melody at this moment. For the battle-scarred, lightweight champion of other days has just finished slipping over one of the most remunerative jokes in the history of pugilism.

Not so many weeks ago a story came out of Chicago which pictured him as a bankrupt, down and out, and as a hustler, as the German army. But, from a sick bed, claimed that he needed money, but qualified his statement in this way:

"I'm not looking for donations. All I want is that some of the fellows who borrowed money from me when I had it should return a little of it now. I loaned out \$250,000 in my fighting days—and most of it is still owing to me."

But a supposed pitiful condition of the heart of number of persons who really were guilty of having extracted money from Bat via his boxing route in the early days—and who had not paid it back. So they dug down into the family bankroll, extracted the much-needed change as was possible, and shipped it along "to help the old boy out."

Money in small amounts began to rain in upon Nelson and after something like \$2,500 had been ferried along to him by men who owed him, he said much—and a whole lot more—Bat let loose this bit of news:

"Say, I wasn't broke, and I ain't down and out. I got too much sense about money matters to lose all my money or to loan all of it. But a lot of guys played me for a sucker when I had it, and they borrowed money, and they didn't pay it back. So I sent out that yarn about being broke to see if they would come through. And they did. I got quite a bankroll from those guys and I guess I'm satisfied now."

Meanwhile, Nelson is chuckling—and the "hold out" friends are gritting molars and biceps.

One of the stories that Jimmy Britt likes to tell about Nelson in furnishing testimony to show that Bat lacks a sense of humor, is this:

"In 1908 Nelson took on Rudy (Boer) in a ten-round, no decision con-

COAST LEAGUE TEAMS GETTING READY FOR THE HOCKEY SEASON

Season Will Begin January 1—Vancouver, Seattle and Victoria Entered.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 19.—Pacific coast hockey teams will start their championship series along about January 1, a few days later than last season, and will play through until early in March, when the champions will clash with the eastern titlholders in the annual world's series for possession of the historic Stanley cup. President Frank Patrick, of the Coast League, stated today that the directors will probably get together the latter part of next week, or earlier, if the quarantine ban is lifted. No definite word has been received concerning Portland's plans, but Vancouver, Seattle and Victoria are starting to get ready for the season, and the likelihood of Portland again entering the race, with the end of the war in sight.

Work of fitting up the Victoria arena is progressing, and it is expected that the plant will be open early in December. Seattle plans on opening the middle of next month, and the Vancouver arena will be open for skating just as soon as the "flu" epidemic abates and the closing order is rescinded.

Whether a double schedule or a schedule similar to last season's will be adopted by the P. C. H. A. is still being decided.

TORONTO DETECTIVE, FORMERLY OF CLINTON, KILLED BY GUNMEN

Frank McCullough Placed Under Arrest Shortly After Shooting.

TORONTO, Nov. 19.—Detective Frank Williams of Clarence street division, was shot and instantly killed last night while attempting to arrest two men who had approached a College street car dealer late in the afternoon with an offer to sell a stolen automobile. Williams was born in Clinton, Ont., where his parents reside. One of the gunners, Frank McCullough, is under arrest.

Detective Williams joined the police force in October, 1914, and had shown himself to be a remarkably keen constable. He was 24 years of age. He was recently promoted to credit, or much of it, for the arrest is given to a daring newsboy, who was selling papers at the corner of Bathurst and King streets, and some comrades who followed him.

The lad responded to the cries from the robbers that McCullough fled past them and when he slipped on the street corner, without hesitation, jumped on the murderer. Williams found when he reached the far store that the men had fled. Within a few minutes, the men drove up and turned their outfit into the stable. As they stepped out of the buggy they were placed under arrest and taken into the dimly-lighted station house.

Three shots were fired by the robbers. With each shot Williams clung more firmly to his position, and reached an archway in the nature of a barricade. He was in a position that he could not draw it. Fighting and scuffling, Williams was taken to the livery stable from King street. Here McCullough fired two more shots, one of which instantly killed Williams.

McCullough was taken to the hospital, but his condition is so serious that he is expected to die.

OUTBREAKS AGAINST JEWS OCCUR IN WEST PART POLISH GALICIA

Numerous Fatalities Have Resulted From Disturbances.

Stockholm, Nov. 19.—Anti-Jewish outbreaks, with numerous fatalities to the Jews, have occurred in several towns in the western part of Polish Galicia, according to the Jewish Press Bureau here. In Siedlce Polish legionaries killed six Jews. The bureau's advisers state, while at Chirznow two Jews were slain. Other anti-Semitic outbreaks have occurred. It is stated at Dombrowa, Jaworzno and other cities.

PLANS PREPARED TO SHIP 250,000 TONS OF FOOD TO AUSTRIA

Relief To Be Sent From U. S. at An Early Date.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Preparations to ship at an early date approximately 250,000 tons of foodstuffs from the United States for the relief of the civilian population of Austria are now under way, it was learned here today.

UNION IS PLANNED. Copenhagen, Nov. 19.—Delegates from Vienna have arrived at Berlin to negotiate a union of German-Austria with Germany.

As a result of negotiations between Denmark and Austria, the latter will receive each month 75,000 tons of oats, 150,000 tons of meat and 250,000 tons of wheat, according to the Berlin correspondent of the Berlingske Tidende.

SOLDIERS CAUSING RIOTS. COPENHAGEN, Nov. 19.—Soldiers returning from the front have been causing riots in Baden and Wurttemberg. They are plundering shops and farms. The peasantry is organizing patrols to protect property.

VOLCANO IS ACTIVE. QUITO, Ecuador, Nov. 19.—The volcano of Tungurahua, in the southern part of the Ecuadorian province of that name, is again showing activity. Ashes are reaching Quito. The volcano reaches a height of about 16,700 feet.

AEROPLANE CARRIED 35. PARIS, Nov. 19.—A huge airplane, carrying 35 passengers, flew over Paris yesterday. The machine started from Combes La Ville, 40 miles from the capital, and returned without a scratch.
