UNIFICATION OF LABOR LAWS BADLY NEEDED

Dominion and Provincial Status Should Be Made To Conform.

CONFERENCE UNANIMOUS

All Agree on This Point—Debate on Each Subject To Be Limited.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 18.—After four days of debate, during which the opinions of labor and the employers on the subjects have been well aired, the work of the national industrial conference is to be speeded up by reducing the hours of debate on each subject. This was decided upon this evening when it was realized that with four days gone, there were yet four items on the agenda untouched.

These four questions have been handed to the committees appointed within a few days of the opening of the conference, and when the reports of the committees are heard there will be allowed a few minutes for each side of the house on each subject.

The subject of joint councils in plants and industries and the establishment of a bureau to promote and establish such councils gave rise to an interesting debate. It was pointed out that while certain plans were giving satisfaction to employers and none felt very confident that the labor side would prove the panacea for all labor's ills. These were collected in a bureau would prove a success except in so far as it might collect data on the working of the labor side and have those facts whipped into shape for either manufacturers or workers to use as they saw fit.

Qualified approval of the labor side was given to the plan, but it was felt that it would be better to have a bureau which would be able to keep up its work in a more permanent way than a committee. 
There was no intention whatever to allow the insertion of any clause which would fight labor unions, Mr. King said he believed in unions, but not necessarily in everything labor had done.

BULGARIA MUST PAY 2,250,000,000 FRANCS

PARIS, Sept. 18.—(Havas).—The Temps today outlines what it says are the principal military and economic stipulations contained in the peace treaty which is to be presented to Bulgaria. These include abolition of obligatory military service and the maintenance of a police force which shall not exceed 20,000 men.

Bulgaria must pay an indemnity of 2,250,000,000 francs, which must be turned over within a specified number of years.

SWIFT CANADIAN COMPANY UNDER FIRE AT WINNIPEG FOR DISCREPANCY IN BOOKS

One Column Showed \$169,225.03 Profit in Total Pork Sales, While Same Sales Credited With Only \$26,413 Profit in Another Column.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 18.—The accounting system of the Swift Canadian Company came under considerable fire at today's session of the board of directors. J. H. Tansley, manager of the company, was asked to explain a discrepancy of over \$140,000 between two columns of the company's books. One column showed a profit of \$169,225.03 on total pork sales, while the other column credited the same sales with only \$26,413 profit.

Mr. Tansley said that the discrepancy was due to a difference in the way the two columns were calculated. He said that the company's books were not audited and that the discrepancy was a result of a clerical error.

LOYD GEORGE HAS TAKEN UP PROBLEM OF RETRENCHMENT

Continued Depreciation of Currency in Europe Causing Alarm.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—Premier Lloyd George, on his return to London from Paris, is reported forthwith to have plunged into the problem of retrenchment. The premier is reported to be discussing the situation, and afterwards to have called the heads of all the spending departments.

The financial difficulties and the continued depreciation of the pound sterling are causing alarm in all the European capitals, and the newspapers are discussing the possibility of a general agreement among the Allies aiming at the stabilizing of exchange.

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GOVERNMENT ADOPTS A NEW METHOD FOR CLOSING OFF DEBATES

CAMOUFLAGED CLOSURE

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—The Tory Government was the inventor of a new method for closing off a debate. The Government closed off a debate on the bill to amend the election act by adjourning the House.

Whatever the reason may have been, however, it is to be expected that the Government would give its best attention to the few matters of proper debate. This afternoon S. W. Jacobs spoke in support of the bill to amend the election act.

In the latter respect the Government has been safe for the Borden Government to hold a by-election. When the general election was held in 1917 there were about a score of seats in the Dominion unrepresented at various times. Since the election eight vacancies have occurred at various times.

The bill of Mr. Jacobs found favor generally in the House, but not with the Government. In Great Britain there are automatic by-elections when the Government is usually ready to adopt British precedent, but not in this case.

Mr. Jacobs' speech was a sparse one. He said that his reasons for opposing the bill were not of a political nature. He said that he was not opposed to the bill, but that he was not in favor of it.

ENFORCE INCOME TAX ACT WITHOUT FEAR, FAVOR OR AFFECTION

Sir Henry was asked by a representative of the Canadian Press Limited as to proceeding taken against those who had failed either to make returns or to pay their tax.

FRENCH SOCIALIST DEPUTY CALLS PACT PEACE OF VIOLENCE

He said that the British and American people had not borne their fair share of the cost of the war.

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POLISH FORCES HAVE DRIVEN BOLSHIEVIK BACK TO THE DVINA

On Ukrainian Front Soviet Troops Have Made Some Gains.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—The Polish forces in Russia have driven the Bolshieviki as far as Dvina, but have suffered a reverse on the Ukrainian front. The Bolshieviki have forced Gen. Radomski out of Radomsk, and are now moving towards the north.

Gen. Denekine holds a line extending roughly from Bielostok to the north of Kiev. The Polish forces continue to advance along the upper Dnieper, but have suffered a reverse further to the northeast, where the Bolshieviki have recaptured Dorena and Sakmachiv.

The Siberians, commanded by Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian Government, continue to advance successfully, and are now within 45 miles of the city of Irkutsk. The Bolshieviki have suffered a reverse in the Archaangel region. The North Russian troops are moving towards the Volga railway and on the Murman front. Since August these forces have captured more than four thousand prisoners, many guns and large quantities of supplies.




