

King of Italy. ROME, May 30.-The German Kaiser, realizing the importance thereof to the stability of the triple alliance, has attempted to arrange a return visit to Rome by the Emperor Francis Joseph or the Archduke Francis Ferdinand of King Humbert's official visit to Vienna in 1881. The opposition of the Vatican could not be overcome, but the idea was to get the emperor to write to the King of Italy that old age prevented his making the long journey to Rome, thus giving the Italian King an opportunity for offering to receive him in some other city. The scheme failed as the emperor would not consent, basing his refusal on the ground that it was his duty as a Catholic sovereign not to oppose the wishes of the Pope.
