Handsome Building on College St. Inaugurated by the Lieutenant-Governor

Lieut.-Gov. Gibson formally opened the new building of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons at the corner of Huron and College-streets yesterday afternoon in the presence of a distinguished gathering of university professors, members of the dental and medical professions and friends of the corlege, among whom were quite a number of ladies. His honor referred briefly to the superior class of practitioners of to-day compared to those of the early to-day compared to those of the early

to-day compared to those of the early days of the college.

Dr. Bonnycastle, president of the college, occupied the chair. He sketched the history of dental education in Ontario from 1868, when dentists were first incorporated as a profession. There were at that time only 150 practising in the province. Since then 1415 had been registered, of whom 940 were still in practice in Ontario. The School of Dentistry had been founded in 1875. Dentistry had been founded in 1875 with eleven students and two process Since then 1131 had been trained in the institution. In 1880 it had been affiliated with Toronto University. In 1896 the building on College-street, just abandoned, was erected, and had been twice enlarged since. The present fine building, cost, including the land, about \$140,000, with \$20,000 worth of

President Falconer referred to the close connection between the college and the university, which he hoped would become even more intimate in the future. The dental profession, he declared, ranks to-day with the other professions, in that the public expected from its members the same standards of professional conduct. 


