

THE GAS COMPANY APPEAL.

Deadlock Between the City and Mr. Johnston

MAY BE FIXED TO-MORROW.

If No Delay the Case May Come Before Privy Council in July.

Board of Control to Tackle the Estimates With a Big Staff—How the Jewish Campaign Will Vote on Saturday—Death of George B. Morris, Formerly of the Waterworks Department—City Hall Matters.

A conference between Mr. J. T. Johnston and the Board of Control has been arranged for to-morrow afternoon, when it is expected that some satisfactory agreement will be arrived at in reference to the appeal in the now celebrated case of Johnston v. The Consumers' Gas Company.

In Macdonald v. Toronto the appeal was by the defendants—the Toronto Railway Company—who were ordered by the Chancellor to grant the city the benefit of the plaintiff's claim. The plaintiff was injured in getting on a horse on the street at the time the Avenue was closed.

The Doctor Wins. In Langille v. Harvey the defendant, who is a surgeon, was ordered to pay the plaintiff \$500 for malpractice on the grounds that there was no evidence of his skill as a surgeon.

The Trustees Not Liable. In Healy v. Gregory the plaintiff appealed. The defendants are the trustees of the Parkdale Baptist Church, and are suing for the amount of \$2000 which they claim to be due to them.

In re Tilsonburg, Lake Erie & Pacific Railway Company, the appeal was by the railway and the Bank of Montreal. The judgment of Justice Robinson, who held that the railway was liable for the loss of a horse, was reversed.

In Bruce v. Fox, the appeal was by the defendant, who is the administrator of the estate of Dinah Fox, deceased. The plaintiff is suing for the amount of \$1000 which she claims to be due to her.

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CROP CONDITIONS.

In Most Places the Outlook is Unusually Good in the United States—European Reports Favorable.

Washington, May 11.—The May returns of the Department of Agriculture show a decline in wheat from the April conditions of 1.2 per cent, 89.2 against 81.4 last month and 82.7 May 1, 1906. As reported in April, the worst injury was from freezing and deficit snow in Illinois, though the bordering States, Indiana, Wisconsin, Iowa and Missouri, report severe winter injury, and States bordering on these, Ohio, Michigan, Nebraska and Kansas, show reduced condition figures.

SILK ARMOR UNPIERCED. Zagler's Anti-Anastomosis Fabric Stands Another Test in the Presence of an Austrian Expert.

Chicago, Ill., May 11.—Kasimer Zagler, the inventor of a new device for protection against bullets, made another report on the impervious silk fabric at Rogers Park yesterday afternoon before Col.
