TORONTO'S BIG DAY AT RIFLE MEETING

Sergt. Elmslie Wins City Match—Pte. Storrar Captures Royal Medalion.

Yesterday was a big day for Toronto marksmen at the O.R.A. meet, now in progress at the Long Branch rifle ranges. In the City of Toronto match at 600 and 600 yards, Sergt. G. Elmslie of the 48th Highlanders, made 115 out of a possible 120, winning first place, \$25 in cash and a gold medal. Sergt. J. T. Steele, C.A.S.C., was second with 114, and Sergt. A. Lucas, Q.O.R., third with 112.

In the extra series contests which will not be finished until the meeting is over on Friday, 35 possibilities have been turned in on the different ranges, 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards. Lieut.-Col. Huggins, O.B.E., secretary of the O.R.A., stated that the shooting was very good, considering the unfamiliarity of many of the rifles with the service rifles which are being used this year for the first time.

Marksmen Satisfied. The marksmen expressed themselves a well satisfied with shooting conditions yesterday. The air was favorable and the visibility good. CONNAUGHT PARK CLUB RAISES SIZE OF PURSES

Ottawa, Aug. 9.—Announcement was made today that the Connaught Park Jockey Club would make a substantial increase in its purses in connection with the fall meet, which is to take place at the local track, Tuesday, August 31, to Tuesday, September 7. They will offer nearly fifteen thousand dollars more than at their last fall meet, which took place in 1917, and approximately \$5000 over and above the offerings they distributed at the June meeting this year. There will be no purse less than \$500, and there will be steepclashes even at \$200, \$100 and one at \$100; also several handicaps at \$1200 and one at \$1500.
