It is many years ago since Everton were in such a bad way as they seem to be at present. On Saturday they were again defeated, and this time it was Sunderland who brought about their overthrow. It was a decisive defeat, too, as the result, 4 to 0. In the past, Sunderland were very disappointing at the beginning of the season, but they have recovered splendidly and look as strong as any team in the first division of the league.

Another notable victory was that recorded by Oldham Athletic over Notts County. This win puts the "Owds" team at second place in the table, and truly the Manchester folks have reason to rejoice just now. In addition to Oldham's victory, the City were again on the winning side, and so also was the United. The City, who still held the leading position, were able to send Blackburn Rovers, last year's champions, away from Hyde Road with a 5-0 defeat. To think of the United accomplished one better by opposing to Newcastle and there winning against the team of all the talents. It was certainly some day for Manchester.

Good Rams.
It was really very creditable of Derby County to take full points away from Bradford City, and Middlesex's win at Chelsea was also a meritorious one. Aston Villa, like Everton, have struck a bad run, and the Blades of Sheffield cut them up on Saturday. The other Sheffield team—Walsley—may feel quite pleased that they were able to draw at West Bromwich. At home the "Blades" of Woolwich were badly quipped by the Hotspurs of Tottenham, who seem to have greatly improved of late.

Second League Change.
On account of Birmingham being only able to draw with Leeds City, and Burnley's handsome victory over Leicester, the leadership of the Second League is again changed, and for a second place to the Turf Moor team. Birmingham are, however, in a better

position, and it may not be long until they again take the lead.
Wolves Beat Tigers.
It was fully expected that Wolverhampton would fall before Hull City, but they didn't, and it was the Tigers who were left lamenting the loss of two valuable points. Poor Bradford still hold the wooden spoon. They could make nothing of Preston North End on Saturday.

In Front Nearly All the Way in Athenaeum "A" League—College First in the "B" League.

The leaders were in front mostly through the series by a slight margin. However, the race was always so close that every team had a chance right to the last week. Experts' Report Favors Tubes Against the Motor Bus Service

"Build the tubes," say the experts in their report, "but we don't agree with the idea of establishing motor buses."
That the idea of establishing a service of buses by the city would not be of any financial benefit to the city is the opinion of Messrs. Arnold and Moyes. The reasons given are that there is a big depreciation, amounting to some 33 per cent. a year and a high cost of operation; the light loads will not cause sufficient revenue to accrue, especially if double deckers are not used.

For rapid transportation to the downtown districts, the experts say that the Teraulay street tube should be constructed with all possible speed, to this to have a branch at Bloor to Sherbourne street and continued on across the Don Valley via the Bloor street viaduct. With the large area still unoccupied and the extensive residential district within the immediate neighborhood, they state that an acceptable profit would be derived out of the operation of the subway during the first year.

ROLLING FOR BIRDS ORDER THIS WEEK

Toronto Bowling Club Will Hang Up Some Big Turkeys For High Scores—League Rolling.

Christmas turkey rolling, the leading feature of the Toronto Bowling Club every season since its opening, will commence Monday morning and finish on Christmas Eve, at eleven o'clock, giving the pin-pullers eight whole days in which to put over the necessary three high or single high games in their respective leagues or clubs. In all, fifteen turkeys will be battled for, and with the high cost of this precious meat at this season of the year, it's a good bet the boys, both young and old, will go in with more determination than in past seasons to land one of the feathered beauties. Included in the competition the season will also be turkeys for the early birds in ten and fivepins; that is, the three highest games in each rolled before twelve o'clock noon. This should prove to be a popular contest with the early-to-bed married men and a few of the staid old bachelors, who also go to bed with the birds.

In league rolling, at the Toronto Bowling Club, during the past week, the News again lengthened their lead in the Business Men's League by winning the odd game from A. T. Ontario Union Drops Alerts After a Lively Discussion

Changes in Rules Adopted at Annual Meeting—Hamilton Team's Representative Failed to Explode a Bomb—Jimmy Dolan Eastern Delegate.

The annual meeting of the Ontario Rugby Football Union was held Saturday afternoon at the King Edward Hotel. President A. R. Denison was in the chair and Secretary E. J. Livingstone was also present. A large proportion of the executive were also on hand. After the meeting was called to order the secretary read the minutes of the last meeting, which were adopted. Delegate A. R. Denison opened the business of the day by asking if at the last meeting a quorum were present, and the secretary quoted the rule, and the president assured him that a sufficient number of members were present.

The principal topic of discussion was the motion that Mr. E. B. MacGillivray put forward at the last meeting, namely, that the Alerts be expelled from the union, as the said club had acted in a manner detrimental to the interests of this union. Mr. MacGillivray asked to be allowed to withdraw the word "expelled," and in its place use the word "dropped." This was satisfactory to everyone.

After a considerable argument on both sides it was carried by 11 in favor and three against and one declined to vote. President Denison spoke on the motion in a very forcible manner, and gave the Alerts a great raking over the coals, claiming that they were not loyal to their union, and they made extremely unnecessary trouble at all time for the officers of the union.

HALIFAX MANAGER SIGNS UP MARKS

Also Gets Scott—May Mean War Between Maritime League and the N.H.A.—Gossip.

Manager Murphy of the Halifax Sox, who is in town and has landed Harry Scott, Marks and Freddy Landers, all of whom were out with the Tecumseh and Toronto pros. Scott signed at \$150, the Indians only offering \$100. Landers is the Ottawa boy who was trying out with the Toronto. Marks was supposed to leave for Quebec on Monday, but he is dissatisfied with conditions there and is very likely to go to the Maritime League. Marks is sure because three other members of the champion team get \$1500, while his contract calls for \$1400.

The Halifax man is also out after some of the local amateur stars. The signing of Marks may cause a war between the N.H.A. and the Maritime League, the agreement having been signed between them.
