**Carpenter Backer Arrives.**

Among the passengers who arrived the other day from France at an Atlantic port was F. Mitchell, an English jockey, well known for several years on the Paris race courses, who is in America to make arrangements for Carpenter, French heavyweight champion boxer and aviator, who will cross the ocean soon.

Mitchell said that he had been several days on the voyage across and could not make any statement until after he had communicated with the committee in Paris in charge of Carpenter's projected tour of this country. It was probable he added, that some definite programme would be decided upon this week.

Mitchell has won the Grand Prix and many other famous French races, but has not ridden since his accident some time ago on the course at Autouil, near Paris, when he severely injured his left leg.

Oxford Oarsman is Wounded.

London, Sept. 8—Lieut. Col. W. A. L. Fletcher, a famous Eton and Oxford oarsman, has been wounded in action on the western front. He rowed for his university in the boat race on four occasions, in 1890, 1891, 1892 and 1893, and in the Christ Church eight which won the Ladies' Plate and the Thames Challenge Cup at Henley, and the four which won the University Fours in 1891 and 1892.

**NOW IN BOSTON FOR BRITISH ARMY RECRUITS**

Brigadier General White Says Not Enough Have Yet Enlisted

Boston, Sept. 11—Brigadier General W. A. White, head of the British recruiting mission to the United States, arrived from New York late yesterday to stimulate recruiting here for the British army.

"To date," he said, "we have secured something more than 6,500 recruits for the various branches of the British service in this country, but this is not enough. This is due to the fact that they have not yet caught the war spirit and that they are receiving such big wages in the United States. Every man of British birth has a duty, however, and if he is not willing to join us he should join the American forces and discharge his obligations to the country in which he lives."
