CAPT. KEEFE PAYS FINE TRIBUTE TO MONCTON SOLDIER

Lance Corporal Doherty of Moncton Risked Life to Save Comrade

Mrs. J. M. Doherty of Moncton, has two sons at the front. One of them is Eugene Doherty, and the other John D., both of whom were born in Moncton, and sons of the late Dr. E. F. Doherty, surgeon to the Maritime Penitentiary. Eugene enlisted as private in the 26th, and since his arrival in France has been promoted to lance-corporal. John D. enlisted in the Battery at Fredricton, but was transferred to Capt. W. A. McKee's Battery in which he is a driver.

Capt. Keefe of the 26th writing from France to a friend in Dorchester, told of an heroic deed done by Lance Corporal Eugene Doherty recently. In a letter to the latter's mother, the recipient of Captain Keefe's letter, writes:

"You will no doubt be surprised to get a letter from me, but I know you will be a very proud woman when you know my reason for writing you."

"In my last letter from Captain Keefe in whose company Eugene is, he told me of how brave your son had been and asked me if I would write and tell you to use his own words, he said: 'Tell her she has one of the bravest boys in the whole army.' The other night one of our listening parties were out when a signal came that one of the boys was wounded, and Doherty, who knew the lad, immediately went forth in full view of the enemy to bring in the wounded boy. As it happened the fellow had made a mistake in the signal and the soldier wasn't wounded."

"So you see, Mrs. Doherty, you have reason to be doubly proud, because being in the trenches your boy is doing his duty, and then because Eugene deliberately risked his life to save the life of a friend. No greater deed can man do than that he lay down his life for a friend."

"Captain Keefe told me that it would make you feel proud and happy, and I assure you I am very proud to know the mother of the hero and the hero himself."

It has been learned that when the entire 26th Battalion volunteered to clear the crater as stated, a few days ago, and only one hundred and fifty of them were selected, Lance Corporal Eugene Doherty was one of the picked force. In that charge it is learned that twenty-six of the one hundred and fifty picked volunteers from this 26th Battalion fell on the battle field, so the danger for the brave band of New Brunswick boys was there.

After a devotional service in which Revs. J. H. A. Anderson, W. H. Barrowclough, R. P. McKim, W. Camp and R. J. Haughton took part, the chaplain spoke of the work of the navy.
